Bill will also have a video presentation by Jennifer E. Jones, the first woman to be nominated to serve as Rotary International President. Her program for District 5440, Courage for Today, occurred January 21, while we were having our last meeting. Jones, member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, will become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the service organization's 115-year existence.



Jennifer Jones, R.I. President Nominee for 2022-23

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc., an award-winning media company in Windsor. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary's Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication effort.

Two grants will help Latino community

The Rotary Club of Estes Park has a longstanding commitment to address areas of need in the local community and has recently awarded two grants to do just that.

Community Service Committee Director Elizabeth Weisberg recently delivered a \$400 grant check from the club to Estes Valley Investment in Childhood Success (EVICS) for purchase of bilingual English/Spanish-language books for EVICS clients. The Estes Park nonprofit, supported entirely through donations and grants, provides family support programs and resources, training and events for childcare providers, and scholarships to families so that they can afford childcare. EVICS' goal is to provide services that will strengthen and support Estes Valley children and families, especially in the early years of life.



Estes Park's Crossroads Ministry was the recipient of an \$1,100 second grant, earmarked for a Mountain Home Café program that provides free meals offered to needy community members. The club donated \$500, and an anonymous Rotary club member added an additional \$600 for the total grant of \$1,100. Crossroads is a Christian service agency helping Estes Valley residents in need. Among other help, Crossroads provides short-term financial, food and other assistance to the temporarily unemployed, working poor and individuals with low fixed incomes.



"When it is safe to have closer physical contact again, our Rotary members are looking forward to working on more in-person projects with EVICS and Crossroads," said Weisberg. "Until then, we are delighted to be able to help support the Latino community in Estes Park with these grants."

Founded in 1926, The Rotary Club of Estes Park is a service organization open to all. The club currently meets both on Zoom and at Nicky's. The 33rd Estes Park Rotary Duck Race Festival will benefit 64 Participating Organizations. They will begin to sell Duck Adoptions in early March. The organizations are busy plotting online sales strategy, as all Duck Adoptions will be handled online.

"Sixty-four local Participating Organization are ready and excited to launch the adoption season stating in early March," said Larry Williams, Rotary Duck Race Festival organizations committee chairman. "This is a great way to support your favorite nonprofit and have fun watching the ducks in the Lazy River on May 1."

By holding the event indoors without crowds and eliminating paper adoption sales and handling, the volunteers who power the race will be kept as safe as possible, according to Big Duck '21 Bill Solms. Fewer Rotarians and town employees and will be needed to support the race this year, so that health and safety can be enhanced until the full scope of activities can return, hopefully in 2022.
