

Red Badge Rotarian Lee Anderson-Harris delivered the story of the women who served in WWII. After meeting her husband, a member of the 10th Mountain Division Living History Group, she developed a passion for this history. Some highlights: • Started in 1942, the Women's Army Aux. Corps or WAAC (later renamed WAC when becoming part of the Army) was aimed at freeing up men for combat - controversial at the time •

Racial segregation existed even in the WAC • They had their own medical staff to treat them • Their roles became more dangerous as the need and confidence in their abilities grew • More than 150,000 served
