ANNOUCEMENTS: Jim Scudamore said members will receive invoices early but they aren't due until October 8th. Rick Parker announced that the Four Way Test committee still needs volunteers for September and October and also please pick up Duck Race sponsor certificates. **Jim Epstein** updated the club on polio this year, there are 70 cases of wild polio detected (which is more than last year) so polio eradication still needs our support. Fred Morey invited members to the Rotary After Hours at his house next Thursday. Rick Scott, from the satellite club, and Jessi Colehour, the ED of One Community, One Family announced their 1st Annual Fundraiser on November 7th. The competition will be hosted with local chefs cooking to see who prepares the best soup, a silent auction and more.

committee report: Mary McCambridge told us that Rotary International trips can change the way you think about RI. She introduced Dr. Mark Anderson who told the club about his RI visits. Dave Mills started the committee and there are 11 members who try to find and support different projects around the world. Education, literacy, water, education, child and maternal health projects are some of the focus areas.

PROGRAM: Scoot Childers introduced Dr. Bob Meroney who talked about Charlie Brown Theology and Charles Shultz. Peanuts was the first cartoon to include more than I-2 characters and Shultz was the first cartoonist to mention themes from the Bible. In October of 1950 Peanuts was first published and in January 2000 the family asked that no other comics be published. Peanut's became the world's most widely read comic strip and was published in over 40 languages. Charles Shultz felt a responsibility to have a message in his comics. He had I2 different characters that developed through the comics all with different personalities. Shultz also integrated short meditations and related scriptures to the cartoons into his comic strips.
