Guest Speaker

Gillian gave us another episode of the USA trip, between Ken and Ula plus Gillian it may keep us going all year.

This talk was all about New Orleans, the city of jazz and blues, with so much history and still recovery from Katrina which was 12 years ago.

The first day was a visit to the World War II museum a must see for anyone going to New Orleans. Each visitor gets the name of someone who served in the war and you can follow them through their adventures through the war. In the evening it was the Fats Waller Show "Ain't Misbehaving", featuring some very talented entertainers.

The next day it was over the Mississippi for a



short ferry ride to Algier, a lazy little township with colourful houses. On arriving back

in New Orleans we landed right in the middle of the Oyster Festival, where we tasted shrimp and oyster po'boys one of the many local dishes. The local oysters were enormous and are usually chargrilled with a delicious sauce liberally poured over the top.

The days there included many walks along the small streets, all a buzz with tourists. Local musicians on every corner, one Doreen Ketchens,

was a must see and really drew in the crowds. Plus we managed to go to Jazz in Park (Armstrong Park) and enjoyed John Cleary a famous



jazz pianist. Another day saw us take a music tour with a local music expert who was a bit of a character, but certainly informed us on all the local colourful characters.

Visiting a plantation was a definite must so we managed to do two in one day. Laura Plantation, although it did not have the traditional white

house look, was very interesting with a very enthusiastic young guide. Interesting that during the time of this



plantation it was mainly women that ran the business, sugar cane.

The other plantation that day was Oaks Alley, named for the

fantastic stands of Live Oak trees, truly impressive. This was a more traditional looking house but the history was not quite as interesting as Laura. Notices of the list of slaves, at



both plantations, together with their values certainly highlighted what it would really have been like to be part of that era.

No trip to New Orleans would be complete without



a trip through the swamps, so off we set for a leisurely boat ride through the bayous. We were treated to trees hanging with Spanish Moss,

which is neither Spanish nor moss, confusing I know. There were alligators tempted to approach the boat with food and then we found a group of wild boars/pigs and we able to get up close and personal, not very pleasant.

A trip to the cemetery was informative, although some of the graves are crumbling, but the bodies were packed in to tombs above ground and as they rotted down would have other members of the family put on top. Interesting to say the least.

We also got to taste the famous Beignets topped with a mountain of icing sugar. Gumbo was another local dish to be tasted, both the traditional and with seafood, very tasty. Oysters were very popular and other seafood delicacies.

A visit to the museum to see the local history as well as some of the famous Mardi Gras costumes was informative.

We even managed a visit to the Mid-City Rotary Club, a vibrant young club with an average age of under 30 years. They made us very welcome and it was interesting to see how passionate they were about their city and just wanted to feel safe again. The Saturday that we were there, they had 13 shootings with three deaths, the highest for the year so far. It is probably the first time that I have seen Rotarians break down and cry as they talk about trying to get their neighbourhood back. Certainly food for thought.

I think all members enjoyed the presentation and it is always good to share experiences and you get to live the holiday all over again
