#### Di Fleischer 'Antique Clocks'

We had a very interesting talk from Di Fleischer, who has worked at Bairnsdale Clocks since 2000. The owner Trevor Herbstreit and Di are clock makers, or horologists (the study of the management of time), with Trevor and his scimitar clock, which took two years to complete, winning both a first prize and a highly recommended at the 2018 Crafts Competition in the United States. Being able to manage time, by whatever means was a powerful tool and gave control over your peers.

The Egyptians had sundials and sand clocks, the Asians using water clocks to keep track of time. The first weight driven clocks came to being in the 1100's but were so expensive were only available to the very rich or clergy which gave them control over their parishioners, using bells to then toll t he hour. The 1300's saw the appearance of clocks with striking mechanisms. 1400's the Italians had clocks that were spring wound and smaller. In 1620 the lantern clock was built, small and contained in a protective case. In 1800 they had the carriage clock, once again smaller and contained in a wooden box, it could be turned upside down without stopping, suitable for carriages. In 1660 the long case clock came into being, Di had one of these with her, so we were able see the complex mechanism inside and the large spikes at

the back where it was hammered into the wall. Grandfather clocks became popular, with large and ornate cases holding all the clock workings, sizes are: Grandfather over 6 feet, Grandmother over 5 feet and the Granddaughter over 4 feet.

The Harrison clock, invented in 1740 was used to accurately record the longitude

and latitude which is used my mariners, Di told us that it took till 1772 for Harrison to eventually receive full payment for his invention. It was interesting to learn that the first battery clock was made in 1838, with glass liquid cells. The anniversary clock was in use in 1879 and as it's name suggests only has to be wound once every 400 days, or once a year. The Germans made the first wrist watches for the military in 1880 and before that cheaper watches were manufactured for the general public and became known as the two bob watch, a term we are all familiar with.



As we know now a days we have clocks and watches in all shapes and sizes, powered by small batteries, but there are many people who love the old type clocks and it should be remembered that those mechanisms were invented and made from the materials to hand in the day. We all found the talk extremely interesting, which was reinforced by the many questions that were asked. So the one stop shop for sales, purchase, repairs and valuations of clocks would be Bairnsdale Clocks and the wealth of knowledge that Di and Trevor have.
