RI President Mark Maloney Victorian Presidential Dinner

ROTARY CONNECTS THE WORLD

Patricia and I made the trip to Ballarat to hear from RI president Mark Maloney, along with 350 other Rotarians, from the five Rotary Districts in Victoria.

His wife Gay spoke about the busy life of a RI President and gave us details of all the countries that they have visited since taking office in July, which was quite a few and it would be hard for them to remember where they are, a bit like "this is Tuesday it must be Belgium" from that old movie. They both live in the same town that Gay was born and bred in, living across the lake from the High School that she attended, so the dreams she had as a young girl, of travelling the world did not eventuate until later in life, Rotary has now given her that experience. This was her fifth visit to Australia and obviously had fond memories of the previous times that she has been here.



Mark told a few funny anecdotes about his past experiences in Australia, battling with our slang and watching an AFL games, puzzled as to why the goal umpires were using semaphore to signal a score when it was fairly obvious that the ball had gone through the posts. He was on the organising committee for the Sydney Convention and although there were a

few glitches, anyone that attended would agree that it was a wonderful convention.

On a more serious note he emphasised the four points of the Rotary strategic plan that has been developed for the next five years, emphasising that we have the ability to make a huge difference in the world

Impact - People of Action are effective problem-solvers.

Reach - People of Action activate and inspire one another.

Engagement - People of Action strive to understand the needs of others.

Adapt - People of Action are inventive, entrepreneurial, and resilient.

Patricia and I had heard most of this before at the webinar that we attended and are confident that our club is moving forward using these strategies, so keep up the good work.



He spoke of the United Nations, which will celebrate 75 years in 2020 and the role that Rotary had to play in its formation, something to be proud of. Of course Polio Plus would be the biggest project that Rotary has tackled and we will not stop until this disease is beaten, partnering with other organisations to ensure a positive outcome.

As with functions like this, it is good to catch up with Rotarians from our District

and elsewhere that we may not have seen for a while and network with new Rotarians. We had Phillip Archer on our table, a great speaker who has on many occasions addressed Rotarians in our district with inspiring words. I caught up with lan, a fellow traveller on the 2016 NID, who was there to receive an award for 30 years of service in Rotary, plus Kel and Jill Hobby, who now live in Ballarat, as some of you will remember he was a DG in 2011-2012. Bonnie will be pleased to hear that we even caught up with Rotarians from Ballarat that she hoped that we would connect with.



As with all these types of events it is good to keep in touch with the latest developments and it was great that Mark Maloney was able to visit Victoria and address so many committed Rotarians. Patricia and I had a relaxing day afterwards touring Ballarat and districts, blowing away some of the cobwebs of everyday life, so a worthwhile trip in all.

How would you go if you were to accept the challenge that these talented and courageous students did? Here are the issues that were debated:

- **1.** Protection of Children in Armed Conflict
- **2.** Measures to Eliminate International Terrorism
- **3.** Moratorium on the Use of the Death Penalty
- **4.** Protection of Global Climate for Present & Future Generations of Humankind
- 5. Permanent Sovereignty of the Palestinian People in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem, and of the Arab Population in the occupied Syrian Golan over their Natural Resources
- **6.** Security Council Resolution on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons
- **7.** The Situation in the South China Sea

No trivial matters!

The format for the Assembly mirrors exactly that of the United Nations and each country represented is expected to present and debate for and against each of the topics under the Rules of the UN.

We sincerely congratulate them for the dedication and research that was required for this event and for giving it a good go!

Jan Lucas Gippsland Engaged Mentoring 10 September 2019

We had Jan Lucas, a program coordinator for Gippsland Engaged Mentoring (GEM) program, which is run through Workways, talk to us about this extremely worthwhile program. They have 100 mentors on their books, not all of which are being utilised and are awaiting Mentees to be assigned to them.

The program has proved to make a difference with one example being a student that had been mentored since grade seven right to the end of secondary college, who had made good personal growth and now has a circle of friends, whereas he was a bit of a loner at first. Jan warned us that the selection process for mentors is quite rigorous, applicants need to have a Working with Children, two character references, plus a police check. Once you get passed all that a two day training session is required. The schools are the ones who identify children in need and then they are matched with an appropriate mentor, permission is sought from the parents of course and Jan was telling us of an occasion when a parent refused, which would have been hard for the student involved.



The whole program operates on government funding on a two year cycle. Jan also indicated that they support and partner with Youth in Search as well as L to P, the latter being a program that we had members of our club involved in a few years ago. It was a very interesting talk and although the process may seem hard, you should think about the difference that you could make in a young person's life.




