

Hopefully we were inspired by the guest speakers who addressed us throughout the year. I believe all Rotarians, and in particular, the proud parents of the Rotarian children who spoke, should be encouraged by the fine achievements of each and everyone of them. We were impressed by the young people from Drouin Secondary College who shared their experiences in the DOVE program, helping to make a difference in the lives of Cambodian families while also discovering the huge impact it had on their own lives. Of great interest to all were the speakers from local businesses, how fortunate we are to have these people in our community perhaps one of our aims should be to tap into this resource and make greater use of their skills.

With the support of the Board and Members, my aim for this year was to support and help the local Community with hands on service work, projects and fund raising. Our monthly market continued to be the back bone of our fundraising, ably run by John and Roger. Both are continually seeking to improve the quality of and services provided by the market. In November, John assisted by Rotarian/auctioneer Peter, ran a highly successful Clearing Sale at Bellbird Park. Funds raised were donated to the drought relief through the Rotary District and East Gippsland. Our Rotarians came to the fore once again when fires hit our area in March. Proceeds of a market were donated to BlazeAide, Rotarians to assisted with cooking meals for BlazeAide volunteers and food was donated. We have been very fortunate as the weather has been very favourable apart from one month in which we had to cancel early in the morning due to poor conditions. I would like to give a special thanks to Roger & Max who organised a spreadsheet showing all stallholder's sites, making the job much easier. After eight year's coordinating the Market on behalf of the Club, I have handed the reins over to Rotarian Roger who ensures its growth and its continued success. We have raised in the Rotary year over \$15,000. As a gesture of help for the Farmer's Drought Relief, we made a grant of \$1,300 early in 2019, followed by a BlazeAide grant.

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

With excellent assistance from the English teacher Simone Hoogeveen from Drouin Secondary College, we were able to select four students to participate in the 2019 MUNA. Our club sponsored one team (two delegates) and we are very grateful to Rotary Club of Warragul for sponsoring the second team.

Students - Thalia Mitchell Yr. 11 with Xavier Swetman Yr. 11 and Emily Little Yr. 10 with Taylah Cunningham Yr. 11 - were involved in the MUNA over a weekend in May at Phillip Island. I attended on Saturday and was very impressed with the students' preparation and their debating ability.



Drouin Overseas Volunteer Experience (DOVE)

The club was pleased to hear from Drouin S.C. teachers (Jayden King and Karen Sandman) and students (Tyson Murray, Corey Taylor and Ruby Simpson) about their recent visit to Cambodia on the DOVE program. The students each raised \$4,100 to participate in the program and the team raised over \$20,000 in total, including our contribution, which was used to provide books, medicine and needed equipment to under-privileged Cambodian children and families. While in Cambodia the DOVE team built a library for a school and equipped it with books. They also built a home for another family. The students could not speak highly enough of the experience and the long lasting effect it has had on them and their attitude to life.



Fit 2 Drive and L2P

2017-18 disbursements include funding sponsorship for the Fit-2-Drive program at Drouin Secondary and Chairo Christian schools in the 2018-19 year, while two Rotarians - Ian Haughton and Ian Symons- volunteer their time to assist learners in the L2P program to reach the required hours practice to earn their licence.

Community Service

Olivia's Place

Our involvement and activities with Olivia's Place have continued throughout the year. Olivia's Place, founded in 2012, by Kirsten Finger & Melissa Raymond, was initially established under a national organisation. It is now governed by a local committee, with a focus on supporting families through the highs and lows of pregnancy and early parenting. The mission of Olivia's Place is to offer support and assistance during any stage of pregnancy and during early parenting - the first year of your child's life. It aims to provide practical, emotional and material support and a much-needed link between those facing any difficulties during pregnancy and early parenting and the services they need, within a professional framework. Rotarians Max Scott and Roger Playdon have provided support mainly through the refurbishment of donated cots. Each cot takes on average 8 hours of work. Max has refurbished 10 cots this year and we have given around 95 hours in total. We now sponsor and provide monthly presence at the Drouin Market.

Drouin Cemetery

The lawn section of Drouin Cemetery is getting back on the level. There has been a group of members, led by Ian Symons who have attended there every second Friday to progressively lift and align the grave plaques in the lawn section. Thanks to those who have collectively contributed around 150 hours to this worthy project. With crowbars, shovels, wheelbarrows, spirit levels, and lots of energy they have focussed their efforts on Section A and a few plaques scattered within the grave's headstones in the general section.

The task is to align the plaques in each line of graves, to lift those that have dropped and to make mowing and maintenance easier.

There is much more to be done and now that a little rain has softened the surface we will be getting on the level again. So come and join the *Friends of the Cemetery* group for a couple of hours and then a cuppa in their tool shed to finish the morning.



Ficifolia Festival Parade

Our support to the Ficifolia Festival this year was again led by Kevin Roberts and we had a very good number of volunteers. Around 5 hours of community support hours were completed.



Australia Day Breakfast

This year's Australia Day Breakfast was as usual arranged by the very committed team of Pauline Maunder and including Anita Coonan under the expert guidance of Keith Pretty. The breakfast was very successful and the report in the Gazette was enlightening.

Much hard work goes into the organisation of the Breakfast and the teams must be congratulated on their efforts. The guests attending never see the huge amount of work done behind the scenes that ensures a smooth and enjoyable Australia Day Breakfast. Around 50 hours of work by Rotarians each year ensures that the 150 plus guests enjoy a great breakfast, provided for forty years by the Drouin CWA. Guests are entertained by both the Warragul Municipal Band and a guest speaker.

Australia Day in the Park

Our usual team of volunteers, led by Bill Petschack, cheerfully arranged a barbeque and activities in Civic Park this year. The turn out was quite poor but we still managed to enjoy some excellent fellowship and turned over quite a few snags etc. The 45 hours provided helped our community to enjoy Australia Day. A good result.

Yooralla

Established as a support service for children with disabilities in 1918. Our support to the Drouin facility this year was again ably led by Kevin Roberts. In fact, he did all of the work, from renovating the art room to re-hanging gates. Kevin is acknowledged as a key contributor to the local operation. His efforts at Yooralla are an inspiration to us all in Drouin Rotary. This year Kevin logged up in excess of 31 hours of volunteer work there.

BlazeAide is a volunteer-based organisation that works with families and individuals in rural Australia after the natural disasters. Working alongside the rural families, the volunteers help to clean-up and rebuild fences and other structures that have been damaged or destroyed. Equally important, volunteers also help to lift the spirits of people who have experienced devastating losses through disaster. BlazeAide volunteers work for many months, not only helping individuals and families, but also helping rebuild the local communities.

This devastating fire, so close to our own back-yard got us moving to help out where we could. We all felt the need to do something. Russell Ford led our Rotarians and their partners in joining the weekly rosters to cook once a fortnight at Bunyip Hall for those selfless volunteers that have spent their days toiling to clean up and replace many, many kilometres of fencing. Overall, we will have contributed around 150 hours of community support by the end of June 2019. Our thanks to Russell for his great organisation and for supplying beverages following the cooking. Kevin Roberts also assisted in helping those affected by the fires. He worked with cutting and stacking wood, delivery of star pickets and delivery of much needed second hand tools to the needy farmers. His efforts contributed 25 hours of hard work.



Overall we have achieved what we set out to do, and that is:

To support our community through hands on assistance as and when required.

To enjoy the mateship and comradery provided when we are engaged in helping others less fortunate than our selves.

And when we add the hours of preparation, administration and general behind-the-scenes service, we can easily claim a total in excess of 2000 hours of community service this Rotary year.


