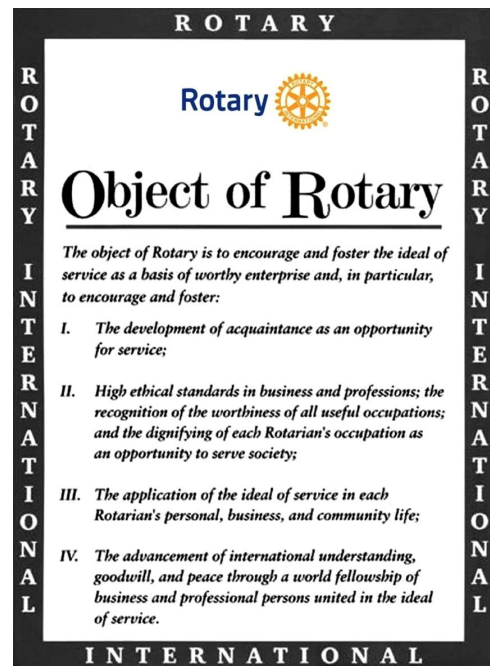

President's Report

2022-23 started with a sigh of relief. Three years of significant disruption by Covid was hopefully at an end and I put to the Board and members that it was time for renewal and rejuvenation.

We agreed to trial two meetings per month and gauge impact on our member's club experience and the potential increased attractiveness of this to potential members. We agreed to enhance, and perhaps re-establish links with our "partners" in the community and, we agreed to further enhance our "public image" with new signage and work for greater visibility.

I wanted our activities to Support Community, Promote Rotary, Make Connections and Enjoy Fellowship.

CLUB SERVICE: To rejuvenate our club. In a concerted effort to strengthen our club and prepare it for future years we needed to focus on club rejuvenation. We looked at our processes and our documentation and sought to make them current and relevant. Notably, Ian Symons undertook the task of renewing/updating all our membership documentation and protocols. Dick Van Leeuwen took the bull by the horns and working to identify prospective new members. We saw that our past sources of fundraising were perhaps less relevant and we moved to realise new opportunities while tailoring those mainstays to the current realities of our club. Rotarians Gary Scanlon and Kevin Roberts have enhanced our gainful activities at Lardner Park while Judy Alexander seeks to lead our market on to greater sustainability.

One of the greatest pleasures a President can experience is to induct new members and I have had that pleasure four times this year. Rejuvenation is a continuous task for all members. Please keep up the good work.

Also of great pleasure is to recognise the contributions of others, particularly through a Paul Harris



Fellowship. And I have been able to do that four times in 2022-23: first Anita Coonan for her service through Rotary and extensively through community engagement; second Jo McKechnie for her personal contributions to Foundation; and then, at Changeover, Sharryn Marshall for her Rotary and community service and, Carolyn Turner for her service in and through her vocation of journalism.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE: To promote Rotary in all that we do. This year we have made sure that all our activity is highly visible as "Rotary in Action", being well signposted and continuing to be well reported in social media and newspapers. Thank you to all involved, especially Tim Wills, in putting Rotary in the positive spotlight and in keeping Drouin Rotary highly visible in and around our community.

COMMUNITY SERVICE & YOUTH SERVICE: To renew relationships with our schools through Youth programs, the Shire through community projects, Service and Community Clubs in and around Drouin and, other Rotary Clubs through our working together.

Early in the year the Board asked members to put forward their ideas for worthwhile and needed community projects. The replies received led to projects and new/rejuvenated partnerships detailed in the 'Service Report' later. One project of particular pride was with Drouin Secondary College, under Bill Petschack's leadership, which not only assisted in the personal growth of the boys involved, but built on our relationship with DSC and, also completed a community infrastructure project with the Shire's involvement. Well done to everyone involved. We have completed nine community projects, and four are ongoing.



COMMUNITY & INTERNATIONAL SERVICE: To support worthwhile causes. The ongoing need for financial support to the many, many organisations locally, nationally and overseas is ever present. Bob Vogt's work in support of Rotary Foundation activities such as raffles and collections has meant that we are able to disburse funds to the foundation over and above our pledged amount. We have an obligation to our Local Community, to our State, our Country and Internationally to support those in need. With this in mind we organized or took part in **sixteen** events this year that have enabled us to donate more than **\$56,918** to worthy causes:

Twenty percent of all disbursements went to our local community;

Twenty percent went to the international community; and

The remaining **sixty percent** went to the wider Australian community.



CONCLUSION

I have been privileged to lead Drouin Rotary this year and am very proud of its achievements. I commend all the reports that follow and detail those activities and achievements for your review.

Our club's main asset is its members. Our many projects and events have been well supported this year and all members should be justly proud of what has been achieved on all fronts.

We continue our strong relationship with our local Warragul and Drouin Gazette with fourteen articles and accompanying photos printed.

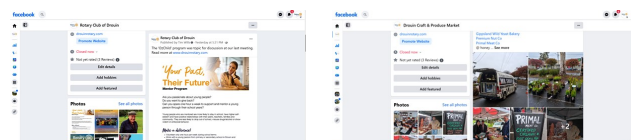


The District Newsletter contained thirteen news items, with photos on our projects in seven of the twelve issues.

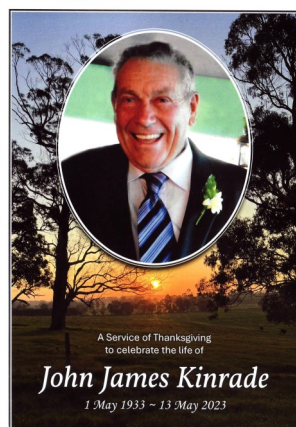

LIVE 4 LIFE PROGRAM



Year 8 students eight local secondary school's attended this program at Lardner Park on 4/8/22, run by the Baw Baw Shire and supported by Lifeline, Wellways, Headspace Morwell and Vic Pol.

The program of different seminars throughout the morning is designed to assist students with mental health issues and suicide prevention.

Our Rotary Club cooked a BBQ of sausages and onions for some 800 students. The polite and friendly manner of the students was exceptional.

On May 1st 2023 Roger, Pauline and myself attended this year's launch of the program at WGAC.

DROUIN SECONDARY COLLEGE VCAL PROJECTS

Five students from Drouin Secondary College's VCAL program were mentored by the Rotary Club to complete a community project. The boys worked with me and Roger Playdon to complete the construction of a table and seats with wheelchair access, and it was placed on a cement slab they laid in Alex Goudie Park.

It was a pleasure to work with these boys and we were very impressed when we learned they had gone personally to thank some of those who had donated goods: Drouin Timber and Hardware, Drouin Garden Centre and Baw Baw Shire.

Another other project saw a group of four students working with Judy Alexander and David Veal on strategies for improvement of the promotion and management of the monthly market.

BIG BLOKES BREAKFAST



Kevin Roberts organised the clean-up after the breakfast at Lardner Park. 13 Rotarians plus Kevin's wife Dianne worked discarding food and bottles from the tables and then set up tables for the next day's event. The project earned the club \$1000. A profitable activity.

GARDEN SHOW



Assisting Lardner Park with the running of the garden show Kevin organised 6 tractor drivers and 6 assistants to ferry people around the event over 2 days. Each day involved 6 hours of work from our members and partners.

BARBECUE REPAIRS

Our BBQ trailer was in need of some urgent repairs. Thanks to John Franklin for organising and fitting a new modern hot water service and new water pump. Now with a flick of a switch it will be so much easier to light. No more trying to light the old pilot light system. John has been cleaning and servicing the BBQ trailer for some 12 years, it is much appreciated.

DE-BADGING AMBULANCE UNIFORMS

Over two days nine Rotarians, partners along with Lions Club members, CWA and off-duty ambulance officers de-badged hundreds of used uniforms to be used by volunteers cleaning up after the floods in Northern Victoria and subsequently, NSW northern rivers. Great effort.

The clean up at this event was well attended by our Rotary Club with some assistance from the Warragul Rotary Club.

CLEAN UP DROUIN

The Committee of Drouin organised a clean-up effort around Drouin on two occasions.

AUSTRALIA DAY BREAKFAST IN THE PARK

Rex Greenland chaired a committee organising a great day for community celebrating Australia Day in Civic Park.



Drouin Lions Club provided give-aways, lollies etc. and the local CWA provide tea, coffee and cakes.

Kids entertainment included a jumping castle, face painting pony rides and the popular animal farm.

The Variety Club "Elvis" cars were on display along with the local Fire Brigade.

The Rotary BBQ was flat out with demand for egg and bacon rolls and sausages. This kept the cooks and servers busy from 8am-12pm.

FARM WORLD

Gary Scanlon and Kevin Roberts organised a well run Farm World roster this year which netted the Club \$7,500.



Bumping-in exhibitors from Monday until Thursday from gates 3 & 4 was followed by various roles on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The event saw good crowds of visitors, and our club had 33 Rotarians plus Bill Zeldenryk, Julia and Tim Hurst staffing the gates, carparks and ticket boxes.

Two tractor – trailers were used to transport visitors around the site. On Saturday night five Rotarians assisted with the popular rodeo.

CIVIC PARK SHELTER

We repaired and repainted the shelter in Civic Park adjacent to the skate park.

BREAKFAST CLUB at DROUIN SECONDARY

DSC asked us to restart a breakfast club. On the Tuesdays and Thursdays of school term, teams of two from the ten Rotary volunteers and eight from Lions, turn up at the college at 7.45 am to prepare toast and a drink of milo for students of all ages.



LIVE ENTERTAINMENT EVENTS



Live in the Park 26th November 2022. The Red Hill Group put on a great show in Drouin Civic Park. Our Club ran a very successful BBQ.

On the 21st of April this year at very short notice our Club was asked by the Red Hill Group to organise parking and camping at Lardner Park on Friday and Saturday night for the Country Music Festival. We were helped out by the Lions Club and Bunyip-Garfield Rotary Club.

LONGWARRY LIONS CLUB FOODBANK



In probably the longest continuous community service project this Club has been involved with, June 30th will mark the end of three years of food parcels deliveries to those in need in Longwarry, Drouin & Warragul.

We became involved with the Longwarry Foodbank at the height of the Covid crisis, which is coordinated by a small band of Longwarry Lions Club members and several community volunteers.

Rotarians, their partner and friends of Rotary have delivered fresh fruit and vegetables as well as frozen meals and groceries to the elderly, infirmed or those without transport to households in Longwarry, Drouin and Warragul.

It is impossible to estimate how many bags have been delivered as it would be in the thousands, nor is it possible to estimate the hundreds of hours of service involved in the project.

Currently there is a team of 16 fortnightly deliveries of food to 18 households in the three towns which is helping to feed these families, many that have children.

While it is not appropriate to name individuals, it should be noted that there are some Rotarians who have been involved in the project since the very first day.

Also it should be recognised that over these three years new Rotarians have come on to replace those who couldn't continue due to health or relocating and there are also a number of Rotarians who have placed their name on an emergency list to be called on when needed.

In these past three years the club and it's friends have not missed one delivery day or left out one family who has been referred to us as being in need.

Apart from our time, the Club has also donated thousands of dollars to supplement the funds needed to provide the food.

In the current economic climate it would appear the need continues.

Rotarian Russell Ford has been at the helm of this project from the beginning and continues organising the monthly roster as well as delivering food every month himself.

Congratulations Russell on a job well done.



AED MAINTENANCE AND REPLACEMENT

A grant from the Baw Baw Shire allowed our Club to purchase a new AED to replace the one stolen from Hong Kong Inn.

Rotarian Leigh Bates fitted the new one inside the restaurant in the original cabinet he refurbished, which was previously located outside. Two signs on the outside of the building show location of such.

Leigh also installed new replacement parts for one purchased by our Club in the Drouin Anglican Church Hall. New batteries and pads were installed in the existing unit in Coles super market also.

HOURS DONATED

It is very difficult to estimate total hours of service given by members in these projects, others detailed elsewhere in this report, such as the Breakfast Club, and the huge amount of time spent 'behind-the-scenes' in research and preparation, meetings, administration, driving around collecting/delivering/checking etc. (including Kevin Roberts latest delivery of tools to East Gippsland) but, a not unreasonable estimate puts our volunteer hours this year at somewhere between two and three thousand hours.

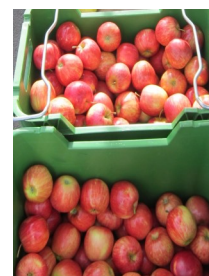

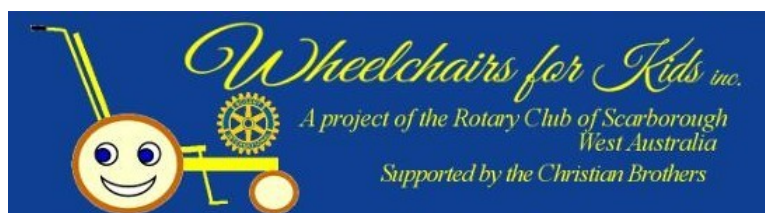
