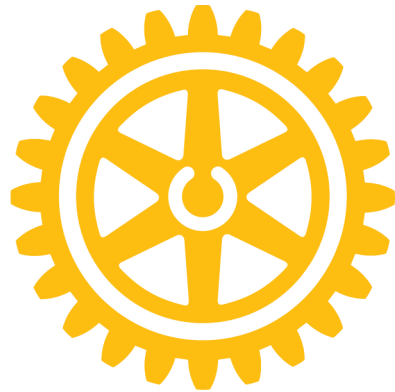

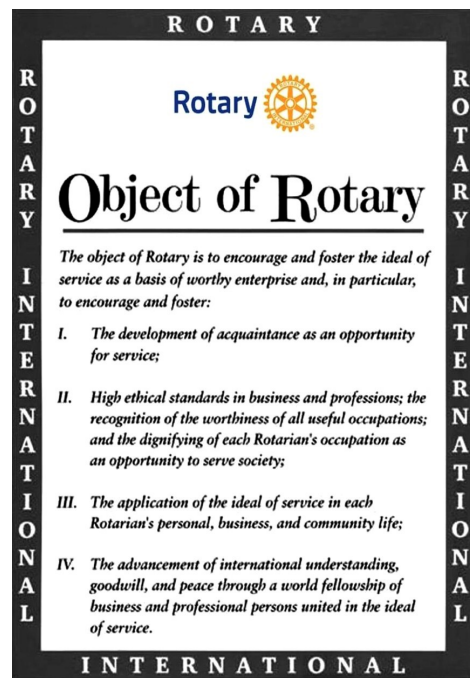

# President's Report

How fortunate was I to have "Create Hope In the World" as the message for my Presidential year, especially as we are experiencing such conflict across the globe.

There have been many highlights of my year and one was certainly celebrating this club's 70th anniversary, a wonderful night with one hundred guests attending. Thanks to Russell Ford for researching and writing the last twenty years of the club with Don Blackley, producing it into a book. Thanks also to Keith Pretty for his detailed reminiscences of the club over seventy years, for sixty five of which he has been a member.

The installation and unveiling of a Rotary Peace Pole in Civic park was very successful, with students from Drouin Primary and St. Ita's participating in this significant ceremony. "May Peace Prevail on Earth" is written in ten languages on the pole and is an enduring symbol of peace for our future.



The 'Drouin has Talent' evening was held in the newly renovated Drouin Hub. Rotarians and their partners displayed their varied talents, raising funds for 'End Polio' across the world.

We continued to reach out to connect with and serve the community – our involvement with the Breakfast Club at Drouin Secondary College is more than serving toast and milo. It provides young students with a friendly, warm and safe environment, modelling to them the value of volunteering.

Similarly, we have assisted the Longwarry Lions with the delivery of food to people in need. This community service has been operating for four years and is more vital than ever as many more people are facing financial stress and food insecurity.

We are gradually increasing the number of women Rotarians, working towards a better gender balance for our club. We must continue this trend and address the need for better diversity, equity and inclusion.

We have welcomed several speakers from various fields, as well as enjoying our own members who have also entertained and informed us at meetings.

Our Social nights on the fifth Tuesday of some months have been a great opportunity for fellowship, along with the Wednesday morning walking group and the Friday morning bike riders. Coffees afterwards have provided support, friendship and time for informal planning of upcoming projects and events.

Our Rotary Family have supported each other in times of joy, illness and grief throughout the year.

We welcomed Slade, Scott and Janette as new members inducted during the year.

Many thanks to the twenty eight Rotarians and partners who worked at the Australia Day Party in the Park. Special thanks to the organizing committee of Roger, Mike, Lois and Dick. A great event serving the Drouin community.

We have been able to give disbursements exceeding \$46,000 to our community and Rotary International. Our major disbursement being \$27,000 to the WGH for emergency trolley stretchers. Locally we have supported groups helping people in need.

It was my great pleasure to give recognition of service through two Paul Harris Fellowships this year. First to Jean Houghton for her commitment and service to education, the arts and community and second, a sapphire pin to Russell Ford for service to this club but also most particularly to the community of Longwarry.

I would like to thank all Rotarians and their partners for their generous support.

# New Generations

After last year's successful project, we were again approached by Drouin Secondary College (DSC) Vocational Stream students for assistance with their project. This year a team led by PP Leigh Bates worked with the students and Parks Victoria to replace rotten steps at Labertouche Caves.

We have continued to support the **Live4Life** Program involving all secondary colleges in Baw Baw Shire, developing and delivering programs and processes in addressing teenage mental health.

It was disappointing that we did not get local colleges to become involved with *Rotary Model United Nations Assembly* (MUNA) or *The Science Experience*, which have been supported in previous years, but we will have a team or teams for MUNA in the coming year.

We were approached by a teacher at Drouin Primary School seeking involvement with the *Rotary Junior Community Volunteer Program*. The program was significantly modified, due to the particular needs of the school and the students, and delivered to twelve students who certainly benefitted from the activity.

Under Rotarian Tim the DSC *Breakfast Club* program has continued this year.

And for the second year in a row, we also provided a \$1,000 support scholarship for students in need at DSC, with a grant from a Rotary District 9820 Foundation.



After a presentation by *Ozchild* at a Dinner Meeting, two of our club's Rotarians have been volunteering in a student mentoring program.

President Pauline has include a donation to this year's *Camp-out-for-Kids* in support of *The Portsea Camp* for under privileged kids.

And, also looking to the future, we have been approached by the a teachers at Drouin Secondary College to assist a group of Year 11 students who will undertake various community service projects in Term 3.

We have found that the more structured approach to meeting with potential new members and discussing the work of Rotary with them works well. New members are better informed about the obligations of membership and that there is a high degree of flexibility in what is expected of them.

Looking ahead to 2024 -25 we will place more emphasis on attracting "Friends of Rotary" – those who are willing to help us complete or staff projects but who do not wish to become actual members. We still have provision for Corporate Members but the Friends approach might be a more attractive option to some.

Attracting new members is only the first step in creating a viable and sustainable club. We all have a role in creating a welcoming and supportive environment for our new members. Thankfully, I can report that we regularly receive positive feedback from visitors to our club about the friendly and welcoming environment we present to them.

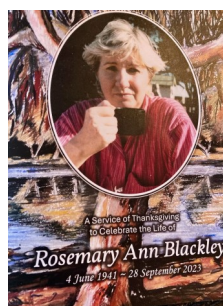
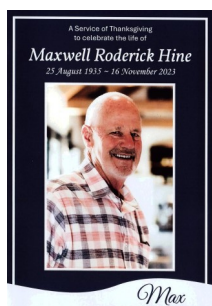

## Drouin Rotary Market



As our Drouin Rotary Market continued this past year there have been a number of changes worth noting.

Initially a small committee was set up to lighten the burden on Manager Ian Symons. He and Roger Playdon were able to put in place a *Stallholders Site & List File System*, making the bookings much more user friendly.

We conducted a stallholder survey, with results leading to a Winter Break for the July and August markets. This enabled time to put in place some changes, including restructuring stallholder sites and placing permanent IDs on each one and, setting up a 'Spring into Spring' promotion for our return market in September.

We applied for and received a small grant from the Bendigo Bank, which was utilized to purchase re-useable shopping bags for distribution to shoppers at the market. We have also set up on-line payments for stallholders, with over half of our monthly bookings now paying prior to the market, which lessens the work load on market day.

For each market we have the use of the BBSC vehicle car park which Rotarians and stallholders can use, thus freeing up more street car parks for shoppers.

Mike Kelleher has taken on the responsibility of the market volunteer roster for each market and we now have a permanent donation box at the BBQ each market, with monthly contributions allocated to a specific cause.

A huge amount of work goes into the day, but that required before and after is also significant and delivered by a few generous individuals: Ian and Michael plan and prepare; Ian Haughton and Kevin Roberts put out and subsequently collect by signs and banners; David Proposch and his small band of Ian Bennett, Ian Symons Bill Petschack and Don Kelly manage the BBQ i.e. prepare, deliver, set up and return so that Bill can clean it down; and, then there is the purchase and collection of drinks, bread, meat and eggs by David Proposch and John Tricarico. A massive effort, every month. Thank you all.

A revision of BBQ prices and Stallholder fees was undertaken with amendments put in place and permanent signage around the Drouin CBD and regular local radio announcements give added value to stallholders.

Our Social Media Profile and Posts are reaching further with followers doubling, and overall general feedback positive. During the past twenty eight days FB posts alone reached almost 6,400 people.

Throughout the year our market continued to grow. Our recent May market was at capacity with a maximum number of stallholders and the BBQ having record sales. There will be no Winter Break this year.

Market mornings create a great social atmosphere of Rotary fellowship and friendship allowing ongoing interaction within the community.

I take this opportunity to thank President Pauline for her valued support. I also give thanks for the on-going support and input from all the Market Committee, along with all Rotarians who volunteer their time each market.

My best wishes to President-Elect Mike Kelleher for every success in the coming Rotary year.

## Drouin Rotary Market



I am pleased to report that our well-established Market has enjoyed a year of consolidation after a brief Winter break. That break was used to review our operating arrangements and, the changes that were made have been well accepted by the stallholders.

Changes made included redefining the site size and numbering to suit a standard 3m x 3m Gazebo. Next has been a progressive stabilisation of the placement of regular stallholders on 'their' site. The mix of stall types has also been improved. Much of the credit for that has been Judy Alexander's work chatting to other stallholders at the other markets she attends. However, we can all take a little bit of the credit too, because we are apparently known as 'a friendly market with a good feel'.

I have established a regular routine of communicating with the stallholders, encouraging them to book early, pre-pay for their site and where possible, trying to meet their requests.

There are some new ideas and themes that will be developed during the next year that should enhance our Market. We will be offering a stall site to a community group each month as a fund-raising opportunity. It is worth noting that community groups during this year have received "in kind" free site use to the value of nearly \$1,000. This is in addition to the very good income figures that have been reported each month.

I particularly want to thank those members who are regular and reliable members of the market crew each month. You have all contributed to the really successful results that the Market has enjoyed this year.

Rotarians and partners (Rex & Jill Greenland, Jane & Roger Playdon, Keith Pretty, Dianne Roberts and Bob & Maggie Vogt) join me and Drouin Lions, CWA, members of *Warragul Neighbourhood House* clubs and off-duty ambulance officers as we continue to de-badge uniforms for repurposing locally, nationally and internationally to worthy causes.

## **Girls Day Out**

The clean up at this event was well attended by the group of twelve who responded to Kevin's call.

## **Australia Day Party in the Park**

Roger Playdon chaired a committee organising a great day for community celebrating Australia Day in Civic Park, involving 26+ Rotarians and partners.

Kids entertainment included a jumping castle, face painting pony rides and the popular animal farm.

## **Farm World Field Days**

Kevin Roberts and Mike Kelleher filled rosters, with technical assistance from Slade Baylis to organise a well run Farm World roster this year.

Bumping-in exhibitors from Monday until Thursday from gates 3 & 4 was followed by various roles on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Our club had twenty five members and partners plus Bill Zeldenryk and AG Di Harrison staffing the gates, carparks and ticket boxes.

Two tractor-trailers used to transport visitors around the site involved many of those previously on gates plus five additional volunteers and Julia Hurst. On Saturday night four Rotarians assisted with the popular rodeo.

## **Breakfast Club at Drouin Secondary College**

## **Longwarry Lions Food Bank Deliveries**

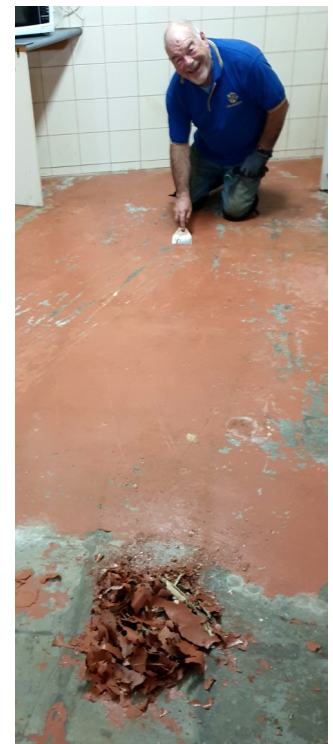
