

The new stretcher trolleys will allow staff to sit and position patients comfortably as well as raising and lowering them all with the touch of a button.







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<u>PROGRAM - 20th February</u> Judy Alexander - 'A start to my story'



Chair Peter Konjevic first updated members on his school talk meeting #14: the school pipe band had won the Australian Championships and played at the Edinburgh Tattoo, after which they won the World Championship. He spoke of his early education as a non English-speaking student in Australia.

Judy then stepped up to the microphone to share with us her 18 relocations in 36 years.

In 1972 Judy married Ian in Traralgon where he was finishing an apprenticeship in earthmoving, while Judy was working at Agee. Three years later a move to Flynn coincided with the birth of their son, Byron. Then, in late 1976 the family headed off to the west coast of Tasmania to settle in Zeehan where, Judy advised, it rained for 333 days of the year. "When it didn't rain the neighbours were out watering their gardens." While there, the family grew with the arrival of a daughter Claire.

Two years later, the Loy Yang construction offered employment opportunities and so back to mainland and a return to Traralgon. Ian did a short stint in PNG and then the family moved to Darwin, living in a small flat in Rabbit Creek, before a move closer to Darwin at Milner where No.1 favourite son started school. Judy described their time there as a great social time for all.

Where next? Well, Traralgon of course. All belongings well packed for transport, including an uncooked and not-fully-dried tortoise shell. That was a joy to discover after weeks in transit!! In 1986, daughter Claire entered a Father's Day competition at KMart and won a weekend trip to Adelaide for her parents to the Australian Grand Prix which Judy said was "great" and, it just happened to lead to a job offer back in Darwin. So, off again.

While there, son Byron was selected to represent the Northern Territory in basketball & while at a training camp, news came of a cyclone warning. So, with no insurance, the family experienced Cyclone Tracey...and survived.

Judy spoke of the diverse group of neighbours in Darwin and the community bonding that followed Cyclone Tracey. "It was like living in a big country town."

In 1988 there was the big overseas trip to Singapore, Hong Kong and Nepal, highlights of which were a spectacular elephant ride and trekking up Mount Shivapurri, Nepal..to be continued, when Judy gets around to it









ROTARY ZONE 8 REGIONALISATION Pilot "The Pilot's main goal is to find ways to more effectively and efficiently support you and your club to increase impact, grow membership, and adapt to changing volunteer needs and expectations."

Two changes we will notice in our club are the change from "cluster" to "community" of clubs and change of our liaison person from "Assistant Governor" to "Community Leader".

1. Regional Community Group: Our club will be part of the community which has Drouin, Warragul, Trafalgar, Korumburra, Leongatha, Phillip Island-San Remo, Wonthaggi, Inverloch and Foster clubs as members. We will actually be the smallest community in the new District 9815 by one club. Our former cluster partners to our east all become part of the large grouping (13) taking in clubs from Moe to Orbost. The concept of 'community' aims, among other goals, to promote club cooperation and joint activity and, to this end, you may note that our cluster covers the Shires of Baw Baw, South Gippsland and Bass Coast which may be partners in our joint activities, as they arise.

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2. Rotary Community Leader (RCL): The Rotary Community Leader (RCL) will lead Club engagement on behalf of the Regional Council, in support of clubs fulfilling their purpose of providing service to others and promoting peace and goodwill in local, regional, and international communities. With no formal authority, the RCL will inspire and mentor Clubs in their Rotary Community Group to expand their community impact, increase the satisfaction of their members, and grow their Clubs. The RCL will coach Club leaders and facilitate access to advice and guidance from Rotary International and the Regional Council, Portfolio Leads and Rotary Specialist Network. It is anticipated that the RCL will be selected by the clubs rather than appointed by the District Governor, as is currently the case with Assistant Governors.

SERVICE & PROJECTS

Drouin Rotary Craft & Produce Market:

Our February Market went off well thanks to the efforts of all members and partners who attended and contributed in some way. The financial result was quite good considering there were only 43 stallholders in attendance. A suggestion was put to the Club that public donation money for the storm victims at Mirboo North be supplemented from the Market profits to total \$1000 and, that this be donated to the Gippsland Emergency Relief Fund (GERF). That was agreed to and is another indication of the benefits that flow to the community from the success of our Market.


