Following the tours, we took a quick trip to Paynesville's Old Pub and had an enjoyable dinner. Those who attended that meeting would have met the three guys from Rotary Club of Canterbury. Bernie and I had met them for lunch at the Bairnsdale Neighbourhood House, hosted by Leanne Jennings who at their request spoke about the difficulties the East Gippsland Rural community were facing. Leanne then took us to her cattle property, showing us and explaining the issues facing her as an example of what others were facing, albeit in a far worse condition. Our 2nd property was a sheep property, or should I say moonscape, in Lindenow South and finally we visited Annie's Cottage Sheep Farm, the condition of which had deteriorated badly since our last visit.

The outcome of these visits has led us on a slightly altered path, in that we will continue to support our Rotary Respite program but also take on, for want of a better name, Farm Aid, which will

organise and administer, with Leanne and the RC of Canterbury, the necessary assistance those properties we can. A sub-committee has been formed to be led by PE Bernie with money man Chris Ashley plus one other who hasn't volunteered yet

2021 – CENTENARY YEAR FOR ROTARY IN AUSTRALIA – A GREAT CHALLENGE/OPPORTUNITY FOR US ALL

Rotary: Give Every Child a Future A Rotary Centenary Project

Overview

2021 marks the centenary of Rotary in Australasia and provides a unique opportunity to celebrate Rotary's achievements over the last 100 years. To do this, Rotarians in Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands, in collaboration with UNICEF, plan to vaccinate 100,000 of the most disadvantaged children and adolescent girls across the Pacific to prevent:

- In women, cervical cancer
- In children, severe diarrhoea caused by rotavirus and meningitis, blood infections and pneumonias caused by pneumococcal disease

Context

While there have been improvements in immunisation services many children still miss out on vaccines. Three times more women die from cervical cancer in the Pacific than in Australia and every year, 1 in 18 children die before their fifth birthday In Kiribati. Many of these lives could be saved by vaccines.

The Project

Rotary will work with UNICEF to introduce three life-saving vaccines across nine Pacific Island countries; the Cook Islands, Kiribati, Nauru, Niue, Samoa, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu. The Asian Development Bank is financing the introduction of these vaccines into four of the countries (Vanuatu, Tonga, Samoa and Tuvalu) while Rotary will fund regional and other supporting activities in those four countries and fully fund the programme in the other five countries.

Impact

Rotary and UNICEF are aiming to vaccinate 100,000 children over four years but this is just the beginning. This project will help strengthen the Pacific's broader health systems and ensure the sustainable delivery of these vaccines into the future. Generations will continue to benefit from this project. A truly inspiring Rotary legacy. Vaccines Human Papillomavirus (HPV) against cervical cancers Pneumococcal vaccine against pneumonias, meningitis and blood infections Rotavirus vaccine against severe diarrhoea Funds will support Vaccines Procurement Supplies Including cold chain equipment, storage and logistics Education Healthcare workers, communities and partners Technical support Policy, management and systems strengthening.



It could be some time before people can think clearly about what they need most and if we learnt one thing after Black Saturday, it was to be patient. May I, as I close, thank the local Rotarians who have provided meals at the various refuge areas or worked as fire fighters through this few days.

May I also add that I have been in touch with a number of our Rotarians living in the fire zone both of the Bunyip fire and the Yinnar South fire and to this point everyone seems to have come through unscathed.
