

Annual Report 2020-21



It was another unusual year, impacted by extraordinary circumstances. For the first half we operated mainly on line, using Zoom, before resuming face to face, just before Christmas. Fortunately our Art Show fell in a window that enabled it to run, almost as normal.

Well done, and thank you to all the members who have contributed to the successes outlined in this report.

We started the year with a Plan and a Budget and our achievements largely align with them. Our primary objective was to identify a significant community project that would deliver both a major community benefit, and raise our relevance and profile in the community. We did not fully fulfil our aspirations, despite extensive research and multiple meetings, with many community organisations, and the availability of funding to do so.

Nonetheless our significant achievements benefitting the Community included -

1. Financial Contributions to two very worthwhile projects benefitting people experiencing homelessness.

One was the commitment of \$20,000 towards the building of a female bathroom at



Fusion in Mt.Martha. At the time of writing this report this project is about to commence. Whilst we additionally secured a District 9820 Grant of \$5000 for this,

unfortunately the inability to complete it by the end of April, meant we could not accept it.

The other major community project was a contribution of \$7,500 to the **Ranch Motel Project** being run by the Mornington Community Information and Support Centre.

We also endeavoured to support New Peninsula Community Caring with their Private Rental Assistance Program.

Thanks especially to Victor and his working group for their efforts with both of these and much more.

2. The continued funding of **Bushfire Relief** with the supply of 1000 trees

(\$1700) propagated by the Briars Nursery for revegetation projects in Gippsland, and the funding (\$5000) of three people to be trained and certified in the use of a Lucas Mill, to mill fence posts from logs. Both of these were managed by the Rotary Clubs in East Gippsland.

3. The Long Table in Mornington Park.

After wrestling with Council building estimate costs for two years we were successful in receiving a Federal Government Strengthening Communities Grant of \$15k, and a further Council Grant of \$5k, in addition to a previous \$5k. With member approval of \$20k from Club funds, we now have the necessary \$45k and will hopefully see construction commence in the next few months.

4. The Bay Trail

In searching for a significant community project that would recognise the Centenary of Rotary Clubs in Australia, in 2021, the Peninsula Cluster of eight Rotary clubs settled on support of the Council's initiative to complete and enhance the Bay Trail. The Cluster working group has had many meetings with Council to identify suitable projects in each club area. In Mornington it looks like our immediate project can be directional signage in Civic Reserve and help to Mt.Eliza with their larger project at Moorooduc Station or Mt.Martha at the Craigie Rd entry to the Briars. Our objective is to kick off in 2021 with an initial project that will develop over several years into a community asset for more than the next 100 years. Our larger project, which depends on Council finalising the Mornington alignment, and with which we might expect reciprocal help from Mt.Martha or Mt.Eliza is likely to be based around the Mornington Station at the corner of Watts and Yuilles Roads.

- 5. Our other Community Projects and Support included
 - a. A contribution of \$1500 to **Mornington Sailability** for a building access project, and although this did not proceed they retain the money for a future similar project
 - b. with **Mornington Primary School**, the sponsorship of some children in supply of books and uniforms and excursions.



c. **A Christmas Train Ride**, with Father Christmas for 50 children and families, managed through the Mornington Community Information and Support Centre. The cost of this was \$1000 and we want to build on this for this year, working with the Mornington Railway Preservation Society, and hopefully Mt.Eliza Rotary Club.

- d. **The Christmas Present Program**, was again organised by the Mornington Community Information and Support Centre, and supported by Nicholas Lynch Real Estate, for advertising and Toyworld for presents.
- e. Fusion's Sleep in Your Car, raising nearly \$3k
- f. Our Valuable fundraising through **Bunnings BBQ's,** recommenced in December led by David Lancashire and helped by many members and partners. We sincerely appreciate Bunnings making this opportunity available to community groups like us.

Well done to our Community Committee which was Chaired by Peter Jay and comprised Ted Moore, Ken Bilham, Eileen Prudden and David Lancashire.

- 1. continued our second year of support for **Molly King**, studying medicine as an **Indigenous Scholarship** holder- \$2500 for calendar year 2021.
- 2. commenced sponsorship of the "Mornington Rotary / Reg Kilborn" Partnership PhD Student, Liam Ryan, to research more effective approaches to Bowel Cancer screening. ARH PhD Partner Sponsorship costs \$12k pa for 3 years, of which half is funded by the partner. See more details attached. So the net cost to the Club is \$6000 for calendar year 2021.
- 3. continued our contribution to **Lift the Lid**, **40**th **Anniversary** ARH's major fundraising initiative, with a contribution of \$5000, on top of a previous \$460.

It was great to see our Past PHD Scholarship holder, Bevan Main, receiving media coverage or his work in the US on Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE) a progressive and fatal brain disease associated with repeated traumatic brain injuries including concussion.

Whilst the Club's ability to raise funds is limited under current circumstances the Term Deposit balance of \$66,437.92 leaves the Club financially able to continue to consider future worthwhile projects.

ART SHOW REPORT 2020 - Richard Vautier

The Mornington Rotary Club have excelled again in presenting an outstanding 49th Art Show.



To all club members, partners and friends of Rotary, congratulations on a job well done. This year, for Covid 19 reasons, we relied less on outside help so this placed a greater level of work on our members and partners – a workload delivered on time and on budget!

During 2020 Covid 19 created some concern as to how we should run the Art Show. At one point in June, it was debated as to whether we should cancel the

Show. In the early stages of planning, the running of a virtual Art Show became a probability as there was no certainty that we would be allowed to run a physical show. Gallery 247 came to the party and we managed to put in place a virtual Art Show, if required. Undaunted, planning for a physical Art Show continued and changes were made when we were forced to make them. In November we agreed to run a physical Art Show which would overlap with a virtual Art Show. More Covid changes will be mentioned later and it will be



interesting to see how many of these changes will be retained for future Art Shows. As it was, we were very lucky. If our Art Show had been a month later, we would have had to change to a virtual Art Show because of the recent lock down. Our Covid Officer was Neil Frost. Neil spent hours telling people to put on face masks and to sign QR codes. It was important for health reasons but also important for Rotary to be seen to be doing the right thing. Thanks Neil

It was very pleasing to see that the artists continued to support the Art Show. Due to socialdistancing we were forced to reduce the number of art works accepted to about 630 (down from 850 last year). Many visitors said that this gave the impression that there was less crowding and gave for a better presentation. Many also suggested that the quality of art work this year was as high, if not higher, than it has ever been.

I would like to single out and thank both Maree Renowden and Barbara Parkinson. Their prime role is to interface with the artists and Gallery 247 and my observation was that both Gallery 247 and the artists provided a large variety of problems that needed to be answered

or overcome. Maree and Barb resolved all these issues and without their input the Art Show would not have been the success that it was.



Although Ian Horton will give more detail later the overall profit from the Art Show was a bit under \$50,000. Our total art and photography sales of 122 was an exceptional tally. The average price of paintings sold was \$800 – a little better than last year. The Virtual Art Show sold 9 paintings which was a little disappointing but as we have nothing to compare it with it was a grateful addition to our result, Due to little cost in running it, the virtual show could well

continue in future Art Shows. We had a great sales percentage from the physical show of 18.1% - a number that any Art Show in Australia would be proud of. Our artisan this year was John Stroomer, a local potter. John was very successful in selling over 25% of his pieces.



The greatest change caused by Covid 19 was on the opening night. Due to social distancing, we were only allowed to have 150 people at the opening. This meant that we had to review our procedures for getting people into the Hall as quickly as possible, we had to change the way we presented food and we had to serve drinks without queues forming. Eileen Prudden and Ted Moore did a great job with the serving of food and drinks. Due to fewer people allowed for opening

night and with fewer paintings in the kitchen area and foyer these areas often appeared deserted. The bright spot in the foyer was the jazz band who again were excellent. The other aspect that detracted from opening night was the cancellation of the silent auction. Another part of the Art Show that was cancelled due to Covid 19 was the raffle. This was unfortunate as the raffle, together with the silent auction, provided some handy income to last year's show.

Australia Day saw John Renowden running around attaching red, white and blue hats and streamers around the hall. We also had Homeground serving coffee and Australian delights during the day and throughout the show. It was a great day – thanks to John, Peter Orton and Homeground.

The sponsorship support, both in cash and in kind, was surprising. Due to Covid 19 we were concerned that sponsorship may have been a struggle but in the end our supporters were

extremely generous. We sincerely thank all our sponsor and I would also like to thank John Parkinson who was in control of our sponsorship programme. A great job John.



The Hall layout was as good as possible under the Covid restrictions. With social distancing it was decided not to use the smaller side galleries and the extension to the kitchen area. It was also decided that we would reduce the number of paintings hung in the hall, on the stage and in the foyer. Clearly the foyer and the kitchen area were disappointing but the main hall and stage were excellent. This was verified by many patrons.

I do not understand how so many screens get put in place so quickly, and a week later get dismantled just as quickly. Only Peter Jay knows how all this works and I thank him enormously.

The lighting for the show continued to improve. We had additional lights placed in the foyer and this was very successful. Thanks to Geoff Gilsenen for making this happen.



Our advertising continues to be effective. We continue to have media articles and advertisements published in local media and a number of magazines. Our own Art Show webpage together with other social media is now extremely important to our success. Thanks to Brian Mann, Maree Renowden and Barbara Parkinson for their help in getting the Art Show to the public. The roadside signage is also an important part of our

advertising. Thanks to Laurie, Ted, Peter and David for erecting and removing these signs.

I would like to thank three people in particular who helped me enormously in preparing and executing the 49th Art Show. Victor Sullivan, John Renowden and Ross Kilborn all gave important advice and support in my role as Chair of the Art Show – I thank them all.

Saving Lives by investing in Research into Bowel Cancer Detection

Most Australians know someone who has been impacted by Bowel Cancer. For high income countries like ours, it's one of the top ten causes of death. The best way to reduce this risk is early detection.

The current detection methods are either an invasive and expensive colonoscopy, or in Australia, the widely available and inexpensive national bowel cancer screening program. Only 40% of people offered this free screening avail themselves of it, and although it's the best test we have, it is only 60% effective in identifying sufferers of bowel cancer. That's still a lot of lives saved.

Mornington Rotary Club and Australian Rotary Health are very pleased to be sponsoring new research into a better way of bowel cancer screening. PhD candidate Liam Ryan, at Deakin University, is researching the use of cell based screening rather than relying on blood detection, used by the current national screening test.

Mornington Club President Ross Kilborn says that this research has the potential to save many more lives through more effective and earlier detection. "Mornington Rotary has had a long commitment to medical research. In the early 1980's the club led research into sudden infant death syndrome, which evolved to the formation of Australian Rotary Health". Since then Australian Rotary Health has contributed over \$50 million dollars to medical research, with an emphasis, since the early 2000's on mental health, especially for young people.

Mornington Rotary has continued its commitment to Australian Rotary Health, having previously sponsored Bevan Main as a PhD candidate for research into Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE); a disease that has recently received much media attention for its impact on players in our football codes. The club is also currently sponsoring an Indigenous student, Molly King, in her studies to become a doctor, and enable her to realise her ambition of improving Indigenous health.
