

## Taverns of the 18th Century Gabe Crocker-Chair



Gabe Crocker introduced Graeme Marsden, a historian and a member of First Foot Guards, a Revolutionary War reenactment group from Boston. Tonight Graeme will focus on

the importance of 18th Century Taverns.

Graeme explained that back in the 18th century, Taverns were extremely important, as well as different. Some were very swanky, while some could have been referred to as a dive.

Taverns were important in the 18th century because they were the meeting places for the towns people. In fact, you couldn't be referred to as a town unless you had a government, a militia, a town common and, of course, a tavern. If you didn't have these, you would be just a settlement.

18th Century Taverns were historically three floors. The first floor offered food and drink. The second floor consisted of rooms where a traveler would stay The third floor was a large meeting room where functions and meetings would take place. There was also an enclosure for livestock outside.

Graeme intertwined the 18th and 19th centuries to give the members a perspective on what is in the locations currently. He spoke of commodities of the Boston area like cod and rum ,a byproduct of sugar. Using the waterways, cod and rum were the highest exported commodities of that era.

Graeme concluded our tour of 18th century taverns with an old English drinking song that emulates our very own Star Spangled Banner.
