> Preventing Identity Theft by Officer Jennifer Pompeo Community Outreach WPD Chair: Jackie Hurstak



Jackie introduced Officer Pompeo, Weymouth police office. Jen has been in law enforcement for ten years. Transferred to Weymouth in 2009. She has been working in the Community Outreach division for two years. She develops public education sessions and materials for the general public. As a senior liaison, she works with Domestic violence victims and advocates and provides substance abuse education. She works closely with the health and fire departments on domestic housing issues. She has a Master's Degree in Criminal Justice from Curry College.

WPD receives many calls from people who are victims of ID theft or need information.

Warning signs of computer viruses: your computer screen goes blank when you log on. Pop up ads are a sign of cookies on your computer. Companies have information about you and sell it to other sources. You can set your computer to reduce or eliminate cookies.

To reduce risk of viruses use a firewall anti virus software. Some recommended brands are Comodo, Zone Alarm, Norton, and Kapersky. Chose strong passwords and change them often. Keep them safe. Jennifer gave examples of strong passwords: use of caps and lower case and numbers mixed. Use different passwords for all on line accounts. Use a lock code on your cell phone and your laptop. When not on line disconnect your computer from internet.

How to know if your identity has been stolen. Check bank accounts, credit cards for charges you did not make. Bills you receive through the mail are missing. People do steal mail to get personal information. Calls from debt collectors. Scams that try to get your personal info: calls from debt collectors or the IRS. People offering to sell you a car or rent you an apartment.

Shred all documents that have any personal info. Lock your car at all times. Do not leave checkbook, purse in your car. Do not carry your Social Security card on you. Do not share too much personal information about yourself on social media.

On line impersonators will try to contact you through suspicious looking e mails and do not click them open. Do not click open attachments. If your identity is stolen file a fraud alert on your credit report by contacting either:

Equifax 1-800-525-6285 **Experian** 1-888-397-3742 **TransUnion** 1-800-680-7289

They will start the process. Create an identity theft report and go to the police department and file a report.

Other widespread scams: There are a lot of Medicare Prescription scams so beware. Social Security will never call you out of the blue and request personal info. Other popular scam are for driveway paving and bait and switch sales info at department stores. Calls from the IRS demanding you pay taxes or get locked up. Calls informing people they won a prize but need to send money first.

Use the National do not call registry.
