Sharing Rotary

Are you aware of the responsibility or obligation most Rotarians fail to perform? Paying their dues? Attending meetings? Contributing to the club's service fund? Participating in club events and projects? No--none of these! Of all the obligations a person accepts when joining a Rotary club, the one in which most Rotarians fail is "sharing Rotary." The policies of Rotary International clearly affirm that every individual Rotarian has an "obligation to share Rotary with others and to help extend Rotary through proposing qualified persons for Rotary club membership." It is estimated that less than 30 percent of the members of most Rotary clubs have ever made the effort to propose a new member. Thus, in every club, there are many Rotarians who readily accept the pleasures of being a Rotarian without ever sharing that privilege with another qualified individual. The Rotary policy on club membership states: "In order for a Rotary club to be fully relevant to its community and responsive to the needs of those in the community, it is important and necessary that the clubs include in its membership all fully qualified prospective members located within its territory. " One merely has to glance through the yellow pages of the local telephone directory to realize that most clubs have not invited qualified members of all businesses and professions into Rotary. Only a Rotarian may propose a customer, neighbor, client, supplier, executive, relative, business associate, professional or other qualified person to join a Rotary club. Have you accepted your obligation to share Rotary? The procedures are very simple, and everyone must know at least one person who should belong to Rotary.



Share your passion for Rotary with your family, friends, and community during Membership and Extension Month in August. This year you're invited to take part in two activities designed to help you remember why you joined Rotary, what keeps you coming back, and why others should join. First, take the **Rotary Membership Challenge**. Commit to sponsor a new member, tell a friend or colleague about your club's projects, or volunteer as a mentor to prospective or new members. 2012-13 District Simplified Grants — The information regarding applications for District Simplified Grants for 2012-2013 is now available online. Please note there are some new requirements for the application form, and also that the reporting requirements and form are with the application. DG Will has requested \$20,008 from RI for DSGs for this year. There is also a checklist with everything which should be helpful. Once an application is received, it will be assigned to a committee member who will contact you about your application and who will follow your application from begin to end when your final report is submitted, if your grant is approved.

2012-13 Group Study Exchange, India—This year District 5750 will be exchanging with District 3090 in northern India. District 3090 is situated along the north western border of India and includes areas of three adjacent states of the Punjab. Haryana and Rajastan. This ancient region has been a cradle of civilization from times immemorial and hence rich in historical and cultural traditions. The oldest Hindu religious book, Rig Veda dating several centuries before Christ was compiled in this land. The whole District is dotted with monuments and buildings of historical Interest. Because the weather is so much more pleasant in the early winter in India that District usually holds its District Conference in February each year. Because we want to send our team to that meeting we will be exchanging earlier this year. The dates for our exchange are outbound from January 28 to February 25th. Inbound will be from April 14th to May 12th.

The G.S.E. Committee is now accepting applications for Team Leaders and Team Members to participate in the program. Team Leader applications are due to GSE Chair Larry Davis by September 1, 2012. Team Member applications are due by October 1, 2012. Host club applications are due by November 1, 2012. Information about the District we will be visiting and the application forms themselves can be found on the District website under the Foundation tab.

This will be our last GSE exchange under the current RI system. The program goes away after this year. If you are at all interested in participating or know someone who might be it is now or never!

Foundation "Points" Rules Change—As of September 17th 2011, the Foundation Recognitions Points policy was changed by the Trustees. Anyone contributing to the Annual Fund, the Polio Plus Fund or a Foundation Grant will qualify for PHF recognition credit and Foundation recognition points. 1 point is awarded for every US dollar contributed, the Rotarian or Donor do not need to have a achieved a Paul Harris Fellow first in order to start accumulating these points.
