In review Dec. 3, 2015

Jennifer Bennerotte, President of Edina Rotary, opened the meeting. She paid tribute to **Aaron Klein**. This was Aaron's last day as our audio-visual guru at Rotary meetings. He has been doing this for Edina Rotary for about 10 years while he has worked with Jennifer at the City of Edina. Aaron works full time at Evine Live. With those responsibilities and a growing family, Aaron decided he needed to reduce his commitments. So he will be leaving us at Rotary and also leaving his part-time job at the City of Edina. Aaron will be missed by Rotary, Jennifer and all his colleagues at the City of Edina. Jennifer presented Aaron a Paul Harris Fellowship in recognition of his extraordinary contributions to the Rotary Club of Edina. Thank you Aaron!

Mark Jessen provided an exceptionally well-considered invocation about gun violence in the United States and led us in the Pledge of Allegiance and Four-Way Test.

Mary Hustad introduced quite a few guests to the meeting, including three of Aaron and Jennifer's colleagues from the City of Edina, and one visiting Rotarian.

Sue Spalding, The Rotary Foundation director for our club, talked about the difference between the Edina Rotary Foundation and The Rotary Foundation (TRF). The primary fundraiser for the Edina Rotary Foundation is the Gala in the fall. But we are just now kicking off the campaign to raise money for TRF, which funds such projects as improving sanitation in Kenya, eliminating Polio and providing ambassadorial scholarships. We have two goals this year: raise at least \$80,000 and get 100 percent participation among our members. Be an international philanthropist. Be a gift to the world.

Shelly Loberg introduced the Rev. Rena Turham, a deacon in the Episcopal Church in Minnesota (ECMN) and a member of ECMN's Cuban Ministry Commission. She was visiting our club to provide an update on her project that we helped sponsor with an international grant. She thanked David Clynes, who brought her project to Rotary: installing clean water filtration systems in Cuba. Toward this end, the \$2,000 gift by the Edina Rotary Foundation was matched by a member of this club, as well as the Pohlad Family Foundation, and donations by several other clubs including St. Cloud, City of Lakes, Downtown Minneapolis and North Minneapolis. They have surpassed their 2016 fundraising goal and are exploring installing a third 3M water purification system in Cuba. This is great way to bring goodwill to Cuba and perhaps an opportunity for Rotary to return to Cuba in the longer term.

Brad Hepp and **Steve Slyce**, with assistance from **Josh Sprague**, inducted two new members into Edina Rotary: **David Aase** and **John Mazzara**. Congratulations and welcome!

Brad Beard introduced the speaker: Lexi Reed Holtum of the Steve Rummler Hope Foundation. Ms. Holtum acknowledged **Sandy Schley**, who was so welcoming to her at Rotary. Ms. Holtum gave a very heartfelt and personal presentation of the dilemma of chronic pain and addiction. She said that 44 people die in the United States each day due to prescription overdose. It is the No. I cause of accidental death. It is a health epidemic. In 2014, Edina Rotary provided the Steve Rummler Hope Foundation with a grant of \$5,000, which was matched by a number of Minnesota Rotary clubs including Excelsior, Burnsville, Buffalo, Bloomington and Eden Prairie. The organization used the money to produce a film to raise awareness and educate people about the problem of chronic pain and prescription overdose. We viewed a condensed version of the very compelling video about her deceased fiancé, Steve Rummler, who had a back injury, became addicted to pain killers and eventually died of an overdose. The organization is now partnering with a number of hospitals to educate patients about the risks of pain killers. In addition, they are working on education, legislation, label changes and distribution of overdose prevention kits.

Sandy Schley thanked the speaker. President Jennifer Bennerotte closed the meeting and reminded everyone that next week our speaker is the Executive Vice President and General Counsel of Best Buy. She encouraged us to go out and "Multiply the gifts we have been given."

Edina Rotary Foundation announces 3 international grants

The Edina Rotary Foundation has awarded three international grants:

Clean Water Project in Cuba

The Rotary Club of Edina is leading a project to provide clean water in two communities within Santiago de Cuba.

After decades of economic isolation, clean drinking water is one of the most critical needs of the Cuban people. The public water and sewage system has broken down after years of disrepair. Water filtration plants are barely operational due to lack of maintenance as a result of inability to import the required parts and equipment. A high percentage of the water pumped into the public water system is not treated or suitable for drinking.

The Rotary Club of Edina, along with the Episcopal Church in Minnesota Cuban Ministry Commission, 3M Corporation and St. Stephen's Episcopal Church of Edina, Rotarian Ed Padilla and the Pohlad Family Foundation, plans to install ultraviolet water filtration systems at two churches to serve the surrounding communities. The systems will be installed in March and April 2016. The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$6,000. A trip to the project site is being planned for the spring.

All-Female Youth Orchestra in Guatemala

Three area Rotary clubs are pooling resources to buy instruments to be used in forming an all-female youth orchestra in Antigua, Guatemala. The Rotary Clubs of South Metro Minneapolis Evenings, Edina and Edina Morningside, along with Rotary District 5950,

provided money for the project, which will be done in partnership with the Rotary Club of Vista Hermosa in Guatemala City to further women's rights.

The money will be used to buy instruments for girls ages 8 to 18 who will join the orchestra this year. Total project cost is estimated to be \$12,600. Rotarians plan to travel to Guatemala in the spring for some hands-on service projects and to see a performance of the orchestra.

Heshima Children's Center in Kenya

Our club is supporting Heshima Children's Center for disabled children in Nairobi, Kenya. Most children with special needs in Kenya live a life that is undignified. Public schools do not provide services for children with special needs. Most special needs children either stay at home or end up attending public school without any specialized instruction. Heshima Children's Center was started with the vision of meeting the needs of these "hidden children." Heshima provides breakfast and lunch; basic educational instruction; and occupational, physical and speech therapy for children with special needs. Heshima also provides jobs to those in the area.

Through its foundation, the Rotary Club of Edina, and Rotary International District 5950 will donate equipment to Heshima, including four wheelchair-accessible bookshelves, five adjustable chairs, three wheelchair-accessible tables, four standing frames for children who need to increase weight bearing, and a printer. The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$7,000.


