Axel Steuer gave his classification talk and told a fascinating story of his youth during the East German occupation and how his earliest days were of being transported on a rail car out of the occupied territory in Poland, and the harrowing journey during the winter of 1952, which led to him being put on a transport ship bound for America. After a rough ride through the north Atlantic, he arrived at Ellis Island and his family's new home. He mentioned stops along the way in Trestletown, Pennsylvania, before settling with his single mother and siblings in Long Beach, California, learning English along the way. His gratitude will always be to the Salvation Army for the care and compassion they showed his family throughout the journey.

He graduated from Occidental College and eventually Harvard with Masters in Divinity. He realized that perhaps the ministry was not for him when it was determined that many of the first marriage ceremonies he performed ended in divorce; so he moved to teaching! Eventually he landed as the president of Gustavus Adolphus College for 10 years, followed by another 11 years at Illinois College before moving into semi-retirement here in Edina. He hopes to continue his service with Rotary after having been a member in the past. Welcome Axel and his wife, Loreli, both of whom are past Paul Harris Fellows. Representative **Ron Erhardt** provided the details and backing that helped to bring the initial funding forward in the Minnesota House to secure the Edina Veteran's Memorial. Through the hard work of Rep. Erhardt, the committee was able to secure \$225,000 in dollars provided it too can raise another \$225,000 to finish the memorial. Thank you to Rep. Erhardt and others who have helped make this important project come to fruition.

We also received an update from the RARE Committee, consisting of **Joe Hayes** and **Bob Stehlik**. The RARE acronym stands for Rotarians Assisting Rotarians. They provide an essential service when it is determined that Club members need to be made aware of information pertaining to current and past Edina Rotarians, families, or when we may be able to provide a helping hand to one another. This is an invaluable service and we thank Bob and Joe for their service throughout the years.

#### Time: 1:00:17

This week's program speaker, Jeff Tollefson, is the director of Genesys Works, a local non-profit that works with economically disadvantaged youth. They help the youth develop skill sets that they can use in today's technology working world. They then

partner with local companies who have found that helping young people at an early stage see the benefits of education and working hard to be productive member of the team can only benefit them later in life.

Genesys Works was founded by Rafael Alvarez in Houston and was brought to the attention of a group that Jeff belongs to here in the Twin Cities—Social Venture Partners. And through his involvement, he began to take an interest in Genesys Works.

Jeff's career started many years earlier as a venture capitalist and, after having success working in private equity, he co-founded Crescendo Partners with a worldwide presence. He was highly successful in providing early-stage capital to some 30 companies in the telecom field. But with the telecom field and the ensuing economic crises of the late 2000s, he saw much of his paper wealth evaporate. He decided that perhaps there was more to his life than making money on paper. Maybe this sudden correction in the market called for more of a correction in life. So he set out on a journey to rediscover that which he was truly meant to do, and after several months of searching (including a borrowed RV trip through Montana) and reading a paper by Michael Josephson called "What Will Matter," he believes he has found that through Genesys Works.

Today Genesys Works is flourishing, not only here in the Twin Cities, but all across the United States. The numbers are staggering. This year they had 720 students apply. They interviewed 465 and selected 280 to participate in a six-week training program. Then the students moved on to the employers who had selected them. This is a celebration when these young men and women find out the companies they are paired with. It seems almost like the NFL Draft because their dreams are coming true. The program's results thus far are staggering—97 percent of participants have enrolled in college courses; 87 percent have shown a solid persistency rate with college curriculum; 96 percent of the participants across the country are students of color who generally come from some of the most economically disadvantaged parts of urban areas. These students spend a half day in school learning the basics they need to move forward in life and the other half day is spent in a professional work environment, where they spend 1,000 hours developing their skills.

Congratulations to Jeff and the entire team at Genesys Works for assisting these young people in preparing for a brighter future than they might otherwise have had!

What was your first job? Straight out of high school, trying to raise money to put myself through college, I was hired as a secretary at a brand new manufacturing plant. At 18, I was the only female employee! I worked with engineers, designers, accountants and skilled laborers. My nearly retired, Detroit-based boss and his wife took me for my first airplane ride over the green fields of lowa in their private plane. With the help of scholarships, student loans and my paychecks, I began college the following summer as a first generation college student. I continued to work during the school year and throughout the summers, earning more scholarships and taking out more student loans to complete a pre-med degree in 3-1/2 years.

Who was your first role model and why? My mother. She had the spirit of an angel, a beautiful singing voice, and the

most contagious, genuine laugh. From my earliest memories, she coached and encouraged, applauded and often said, "The sky is the limit. You can be and do anything you desire." Hard working, an extremely dedicated Christian, and wise beyond belief, she was always helping others, loving others and loved by everyone.

To her four daughters, she was a cherished friend and saint. She left us at age 56, and to this day, hers was the longest funeral procession to the cemetery that anyone had ever seen. Why did you want to join Rotary? To meet new people, build relationships and expand my mission to serve others. I was a member of St. Louis Park Rotary for several years before being recruited for a new position in California. What do you like best about being part of the Rotary Club of Edina? Renewing friendships with people I knew while at Park Nicollet Foundation for 15 years. Meeting new

people who are already becoming friends. Being part of Rotary's worldwide impact of changing and improving lives.

What one piece of advice do you offer other business leaders? Continue to reach out and give of yourself. Make a difference...every day!

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
