quoting "He is no fool who gives up what he can't keep to gain what he can't lose." Great words of encouragement, Joel!

District Governor Tim Murphy then introduced our speaker, Ray Klinginsmith, a Rotarian for 54 years who has served Rotary in innumerable roles, including 2010–2011 Rotary International President and current Trustee of The Rotary Foundation. Ray's talk focused on the future vision plan for TRF and the new grants model that several trustees have been reviewing, which especially considers the Sustainability, Simplicity, and Impact of grants. By the way, essentially 100 percent of funds donated to TRF are used for grants, so it is truly an efficient method of giving.

Ray also discussed the membership growth plans for each region important because U.S. Rotary membership has been falling approximately I percent annually over the past decade, while worldwide membership has been about flat. Ray tells us that Rotary must grow and evolve to remain dynamic. Strategic planning is occurring now to decide on a new international focal point and structure for the time when polio is completely eradicated.

Jon Barnett thanked Ray for sharing his insights and stories, mentioning our Club's gifts to both TRF and PolioPlus.

Jennifer closed the meeting by admitting she had been nervous all week about this meeting and its VIP speaker and guests, comparing this to when she was trying to earn her driver's license (ask her if you missed the story). You did great, Jennifer!
