In review

Nov. 11, 2015

This annual joint meeting with the Area 3 Rotary clubs is a highlight of the year. The banquet room at the Edina Country Club was packed with Rotarians, veterans and active service members. **District Governor Tim Murphy** opened the meeting by introducing Emcee Dave Mona. Bloomington VFW Post 1260 Presented Colors, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the National Anthem led by the Rotary Brass Quintet. The Rev. Sol Grosskopf gave the Invocation.

Mona warmly introduced our U.S. senator, Amy Klobuchar. Klobuchar's presentation focused on supporting veterans and those on active duty, reminding us this date is the anniversary of many significant military events in which Minnesota soldiers had a major part. She traced Minnesota involvement all the way back to the Civil War. She pointed out the right of everyone to express our own opinion about war, but we must match that right with the responsibility not to take out our disagreements on those whom we ask to serve in the military. Klobuchar proudly announced bipartisan agreement on the defense budget.

Following lunch, Emcee Mona introduced a number of dignitaries, including the Rotary Club presidents and elected officials from our area. That was followed by the traditional introduction of each military service with their service song played by the Rotary Brass Band.

Our own Edina Rotarian **Brigadier General (ret) Dennis Schulstad** gave a very personal introduction of his close friend Major General (ret) Paul Rehkamp. Gen. Rehkamp responded "You can't have a bad day if Schulstad introduces you!" In his remarks, Schulstad reminded us that MN Reserve and Guard "Citizen Soldiers," formerly considered as "surplus," are now absolutely "key" to all of our military engagements around the world.

Gen. Rehkamp said there have been 45 million men and women in U.S. military service since the Revolutionary War, with 22 living million veterans. Congress renamed Armistice Day to Veterans Day in 1954 to more accurately reflect we are recognizing our service members rather than the wars. When Gen. Rehkamp entered the military it was comprised almost entirely of males, with half volunteers and half draftees. We now have an all volunteer military, with 18 percent women and 42 percent from the South. He disposed of several myths about the makeup of our military, stating the portion of minorities is the same as in the general population, more members come from high-income vs. low-income backgrounds, the average age is 29, and the average education level exceeds that of the general population, with a minimum requirement of a high school diploma.

Gen. Rehkamp asked all service members present to stand and repeat the oath they took upon joining the military. He closed his comments by alerting us to the fact the representation of veterans in Congress has declined from 340 in 1977 to 82 today, and he wondered what effect that might have on future policy and support of our military. He received a standing ovation at the conclusion of his presentation.

Bloomington VFW Post 1260 retired the Colors, followed by Emcee Mona adjourning the meeting.
