

ROTARY: CLEAN WATER SAVES LIVES!

Contributions to The Rotary Foundation help us do good in the world. Last month, we shared that one of the Foundation's Areas of Focus is Child and Maternal Health and how our efforts make sure mothers and babies don't die.

This month, we'd like to talk about another of the Areas of Focus: Water and Sanitation. Did you know that over 4,000 people die daily from contaminated water, with the majority being under 5 or over 80? Or that the rural poor often pay over 1/3 of their daily income for bottled water?

How about that fewer than one in three people around the world have access to a toilet? And, did you know about half of all girls worldwide attend schools without toilets...causing them to drop out when they reach puberty?



These are more reasons your donation to The Rotary Foundation is so important! With your donation, you help to make sure people have access to safe drinking water and toilets. This leads to better health, more education, and less death around the world. See the attached picture of a school in Agra, India: when toilets and running water were installed thanks to a Rotary grant, *the amount of girls that attended the school went from 40 to 400!*

A BETTER ANGELS WORKSHOP: Depolarizing America: Starting with Yourself and the People on Your Own Side

We may live in the most divisive time since the 1850's. In this presentation you will see how people with very different political viewpoints can come to understand one another beyond stereotypes and find common ground. You will learn a couple of specific skills for talking with loved ones on the other political side. And you will have a chance to link up with the <u>Better Angels</u> local and national effort to show how we can have sharp political differences without denigrating and demonizing one another.

Much of today's epidemic of toxic polarization is driven by how we talk with like-minded people about those on the other side. Too often we stereotype, dismiss, or ridicule our fellow citizens who support the other political party, its leaders, and its policies. Political conflict and stereotyping have always been around but were less problematic when people interacted more outside their own silos. Nowadays, people on the other side have become not just strangers but enemies. How we talk among ourselves about them fuels fires that threaten our democracy.

What if we learn the discipline of non-polarizing attitudes and words about the political "Other" with whom we share a national past and future?

This workshop will:

- Help you become more aware of polarization inside us and between us
- Teach you skills for being critical—even sharply critical—without demonizing, dismissing, and stereotyping

Help you learn how to intervene in a constructive way in social conversations that veer into contempt and ridicule for people who hold other political views.

Presenter: Bill Doherty, PhD is a University of Minnesota Professor of Family Social Science and marriage and family therapist.

The <u>Rotary Foundation</u> reaches mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Mobile prenatal clinics

Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. Rotary provided a fully equipped medical Jeep to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

Cancer screening

Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness trainings around Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to late diagnosis.

Preventing injuries and deaths

Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five-year pilot to <u>save lives of mothers and children</u>during home deliveries in Nigeria. Since 2005, they've also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas — 500 more than their initial goal — restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.

ROTARY CHANGED THE WAY I SEE THE WORLD

Watching the news today can create a lot of anxiety. Have you noticed how upside down the world can seem at times? But whenever I find myself feeling the darkness of the world we live in, I remember the positive experiences I have had in Rotary programs, and how they have made me an optimist.

I'm 30-years-old, and my first experience in Rotary was at 13. Invited by friends, I went to my first Interact Club meeting, and didn't want to leave.

I grew up in Chopinzinho, a small Brazilian city with less than 20,000 inhabitants. Teenagers have two options

for fun: Interact or the church. I chose the first. In Interact, I learned values that only volunteer work can instill: empathy, responsibility, and a sense of community.

But my greatest experience in Rotary was yet to come. At 16, I left my village to spend a year in La Paz, Mexico as a Rotary Youth Exchange Student. Few things make a young person mature as quickly as a cultural exchange. In Mexico, I was welcomed by incredible families; each family had its differences, and each taught me lessons I will carry with me the rest of my life.

During my exchange year, a tsunami devastated several countries in Asia in December 2004, killing millions of people. Among the victims were relatives of a Thai friend of mine who was in the same region where I was. That was the first time I realized that borders were nothing more than meaningless conventions. The pain of our friends is also our pain, as long as we are able to open up to the world.

After my exchange, Rotary continued to form me. I returned to Brazil and studied journalism. I became involved with a local Rotaract club.

In 2009, as I was about to finish college, Rotary gave me a new opportunity to travel the world. This time to the United States, where I was awarded a scholarship for the New Generations Service Exchange Program. For three months, I met communications professionals and companies who broadened my world view. At the same time, I interviewed many immigrants from the Mexican community in California to write a book report. The result was Al Otro Lado: Histórias de Vidas Latinas en Un Recorte de la Inmigración Mexicana en los Estados Unidos, work with which I earned a degree in Journalism.

I then worked for six years as a reporter and business entrepreneurship editor for Grupo Abril. the largest magazine publisher Brazil. ı currently working in a consultancy that helps large companies and nongovernmental organizations identify and manage causes of social impact. It's a way to continue working on issues that move the world in the right direction, which helps me keep an optimistic view of society.

Being part of the Rotary family made me a more complete professional. But that's not all. I feel that the experience changed my relationship with the world for the better. These are learnings that make sure that, wherever I am, I am able to get ahead and do something more.
