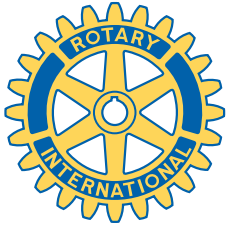

From the president's desk

WELCOME TO THE 2010-2011 ROTARY YEAR!

We begin a new year with some items of interest in the management of our club and some changes of significance from our Rotary District 5960 and Rotary International. In addition to announcements at Club meetings, I plan to take advantage of a column each month in the Moccasin Flower to communicate information to the broader membership.

Our Rotary Club:

- **Rotary Office:** The Rotary Office is maintaining core office hours M-F from 9:00 to 2:00 p.m. This enables Peggy Schroeder to schedule uninterrupted time to complete the many other duties of the Administrative Director. She can be contacted at 252-0085 or www.romnrotary@charter.net.

- **Speaker Honorarium:** The recipient of the Speaker honorarium for 2010-2011 is Locker Room for Life a program for youth impacted by crime (often one or both parents have been incarcerated or otherwise involved in criminal activity). Adult mentors from this program provide homework help, tutoring and recreational activities to help the youth make positive life choices. Locker Room for Life was also the recipient of a Rochester Rotary Club Literacy award earlier this spring.
- **Investment Committee:** Under Dana Funk's leadership and with Paul Barton as Treasurer, an ad hoc committee reviewed the investments and purpose of the Rochester Rotary Club Foundation making further recommendation for the establishment of a permanent Investment Committee. The Board approved the recommendation and an Investment Committee is formed with Current Treasurer (Paul Tieskoetter) Past Treasurer (Paul Barton) one member at large to be appointed by the Board to serve a three year term (Jim Wiekamp). A permanent Investment Committee will provide more active oversight of the Foundation's assets, and recommend guidelines for use of funds. The assets of the Rotary Club Foundation are housed at Rochester Area Foundation and that relationship will continue. The Investment Committee will make quarterly reports to the Board.

- **YOUTH PROTECTION POLICY: *Protecting the Youth We Cherish, Your Rotary Club and You***— The Youth Protection Policy begins implementation for all Clubs in the District effective July 2010. As part of the 1.2 million Rotarians around the world, the active involvement with youth has been a primary focus for the Rochester Rotary Club. This will not change, but in today's world, we have a need to put in place policies and procedures for the protection of youth as well as the protection of Rotarians who work with them. The implementation of the policy requires training and certification of Rotarians and others who have significant interaction with youth for such programs as Strive, Camp RYLA, Youth Exchange, etc. These processes and procedures will be done under the capable assistance of our Club's co-chairs for Youth Protection, Kim Adams and Hilla Ferguson. They will be doing training for the Board at our meeting on August 12 and will also do a presentation to the membership at our meeting on August 19.

Rotary International

- **FUTURE VISION PILOT PROJECT:** District 5960 is one of 100 other Rotary Districts to participate in an initial pilot project before it is adopted universally. The vision is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, good will and peace through improvement of health and support of education and elimination of poverty. There two types of grants as part of this program:
 - o Global Grants such as scholars, humanitarian work, vocational teams (these require partnership with other Future Vision Pilot Districts)
 - o District Grants: Service projects, scholarships Vocational Teams (GSE)

For the Rochester Rotary Club these efforts fall under the overall leadership of David Moertel, The Director for International Service and Judith O' Fallon, Chair of the SE-MN World Community Service Committee.

STRIVE 2010-2011

We will be kicking off the 2010-2011 STRIVE program at a joint meeting of the Rochester Rotary Clubs on Thursday, August 26th. The STRIVE program is a program for high school juniors and seniors who have faced some academic challenges but want to make the most of their last year of high school. Students who choose to participate in STRIVE are matched with an adult mentor from one of the Rochester Rotary Clubs. Mentors are not tutors but are there to offer support, encouragement, and assistance. Students and mentors meet once a month for about 50 minutes during the school day. The meetings include time to talk about how school is going, presentations on topics relevant to life after high school, and fun group activities. The goal is for the students to improve their grades. Scholarships are awarded to those who show the most improvement in their GPA during the first three quarters.



At the August 26th meeting an overview of the program will be presented. There will be testimonials from mentors and students so that Rotary members will be able to hear first-hand at the difference this program makes in the lives of these young people. There will be opportunities to ask questions and to sign up to be a mentor.

What is The Rochester Rotary Club Foundation and how does it differ from The Rotary Foundation?

The Rochester Rotary Club Foundation was established in 1988 for two purposes:

- To have a tax deductible charitable recipient for charitable projects for the local club.
- To raise enough money so that the earnings would generate some base for annual projects and thereby avoid passing the hat as much as possible.



The Rochester Rotary Club is often transactional, that is, proceeds from the Basketball tournament and the auction are received and disbursed from this fund as restricted balances. The unrestricted assets in the Foundation account actually form a small endowment. In 1998 the funds were transferred to the Rochester Area Foundation for management.

Each member of the Rochester Rotary Club who participates in fund raising activities, such as purchase of basketball tickets, donation or purchase of auction items helps grow the funds in the Rochester Rotary Club Foundation. Direct contributions can also be made, through memorial gifts for example. Funds contributed to the Rochester Rotary Club Foundation do not qualify for Paul Harris Fellowship awards.

The newly appointed Investment Committee will monitor the activity of Rochester Rotary Club Foundation accounts with regular reports to the Board and the membership.

The Rotary Foundation—Every Rotarian Every Year

Our individual contributions to the Rotary Foundation help fund Polio Plus, scholar programs (Rotary Peace scholars and Ambassadorial scholars) and Global grants in the 6 focus areas:

- Peace and conflict resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

This is Rotary at work in the world community. Contributions to the Rotary International Foundation do count toward Paul Harris Fellowship awards.

Historic moments - Rotary mottos

Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization.



In 1911, He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mottoes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified by the 2004 Council to They Profit Most Who Serve Best and by the 2010 Council to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best.

Rotary West Africa Project Fair and Village Immunization Trip



Have you ever heard Rotarians speak about their personal experience participating in a polio eradication exercise? These trips have a profound effect upon the individual. For those of you who have gone on one of these trips you know, and for those of you who have yet to enjoy this experience, you should.

You get up early in the morning, travel with local Rotarians to a village, health clinic or impoverished neighborhood, and for the next few hours, you change. Small children come up to you and throw open their mouths with the trust that you will help them. Mothers and fathers smile at you knowing that you are giving their child a chance for a better life. It is hot; it is dusty; it makes you uncomfortable; it is exquisite.

Fortunately, Rotary has almost eradicated polio. However, Africa is still challenged by public health issues that can be addressed by special immunization efforts. When polio is gone, millions of children still need our help. This program is designed to offer an identical experience to participating in a polio eradication day. The people who take this trip will have the same experience as participating in a polio immunization trip; the only difference will be what is in the dropper.

The purpose of this e-mail is to offer to you and the Rotarians in your club and District, such an opportunity. From **November 3-12, 2010**, Rotarians will travel to Accra, Ghana, West Africa to attend the 6th Annual West Africa Project Fair, participate in village immunization program modeled after the polio NID programs, and to engage with the local Rotarians in a community service program. **The West Africa Project Fair is an official program of Rotary's Reach Out to Africa Program.**

Trip Dates: November, 3 -12, 2010

Travel to: Accra, Ghana (West Africa)

Program includes: Hotel accommodations, transfers, most meals, hands-on immunization field work, visits to local communities to experience and explore and to provide service to Rotarian humanitarian programs, West Africa Project Fair registration, special Rotary and fellowship events, sightseeing, etc.

In addition to the immunization program, participants will spend time with Ghanaian Rotarians to explore their communities and see the *service* and experience *fellowship* that only Rotary can provide. Further, **participants will attend a two-day West Africa Project Fair**, where Rotarians from 15 West African nations will present possible humanitarian grant projects. It is an extraordinary event that will expose your members to new cultures, projects, friends and opportunities.

For those of you who have made one of these trips in the past, you may not have the ability to join us. You are encouraged to invite the Rotarians in your club or District to join this program.

Let me know if you have any questions. **Because of limited space, we expect this program will sell out in the next few weeks.** I hope that you will join fellow Rotarians to provide service, fellowship and a wonderful highlight of your experience as a Rotarian. We hope to hear from you soon.
