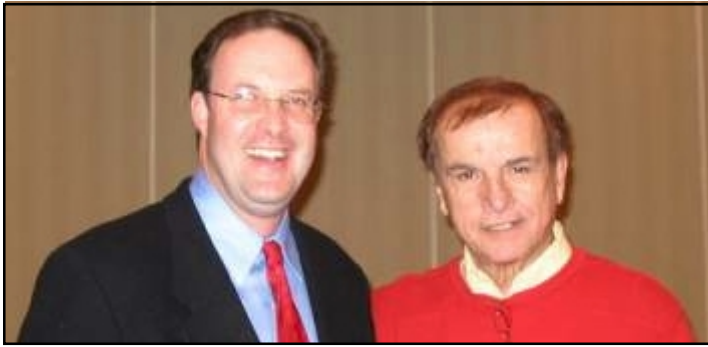

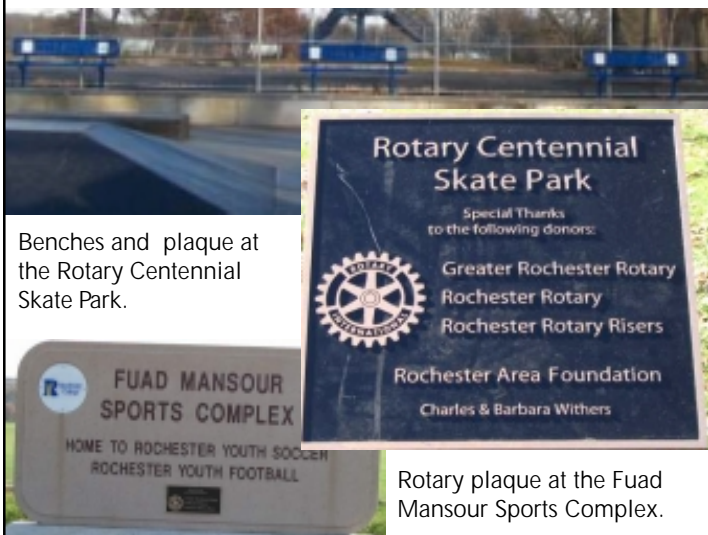

LETTER FROM OUR YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT TRICIA ANKLAN

School ends December 15th or 20th, we really aren't sure the exact date yet. Things in Chile are a *little* unorganized. December is the start of summer in the Southern hemisphere. In January my oldest sister Mili is coming home, I cannot wait, I love her! After I hang out with her, I'm going to the South with all the exchange students who are in Chile this year. It is gorgeous, there is snow, glaciers, penguins, check it out on line. Then in February my family is going to the beach, La Serena, Santiago (the best city in the world), Argentina, and a HUGE music festival on this really beautiful beach city of like three million people.

My Spanish is improving, it is a LOT better than when I left. Classes are getting a little bit easier, I actually more or less understand the lessons, which is always fun. School is really fun, my friends are amazing. It is more or less the end of the year, which means we have a lot of tests, and that's rather difficult when you are the stupid gringa. I'm actually passing some classes now, AWESOME! Last week I gave an oral presentation on Neoclassic literature, I've definitely had projects that have gone better . . . the entire class bursting out laughing while your in the middle of speaking doesn't give you the best feeling.

The day after Halloween we celebrated the day of the saints! That was ultra cool. So I woke up at ten or so, which is like ridiculously early in Chile, and went to the cemetery with my sister and Mom. The place was like PACKED OUT. We learned a little bit about the Day of the Saints in Spanish class, but man this was insane. We got to the Cemetery and seriously like every person in the country was probably there. My family went around to the shrines of about half the city. For real, you go to the tomb of pretty much every dead person you know, then you clean it, it was so strange people were like sweeping the dirt at the base of the tombs, very unpractical. hahaahaha. People aren't put in the ground here, that's only if you're really really poor- you go into a huge tomb like thing with pictures and paintings and man it's wild.

In November or so I had my first Chilean folklore dancing presentation. Wow, that was probably the funniest thing in the world. Chilean dancing is so cute! We had little dresses and costumes and oh man, we pranced all around, really I cannot describe it, but I do have a DVD of it that will probably kill you all with laughter. I am . . . not the most "natural" Chilean dancer. There are so many good stories I want to tell you all right now, but they're not as good when you just read it.
