Bell Ringing – Salvation Army Paul Bleimeyer, Mark Neville

Bell ringing is a very rewarding service project. During the holiday season, two hour shifts are scheduled for Saturdays at various locations where Rotarians man the red kettles encouraging others to drop in a little change. This can be done by singing, playing musical instruments or just visiting with people as the walk by, but a manned kettle produces more then six times the donations than an unmanned kettle. These donations help with the expenses of medical care, dental care, housing, clothing, food and financial assistance. During the 2006 campaign, our Rotary club received the Red Kettle Award for raising more than \$9,600 during the hours of our service.





Rotary Club of Rochester YouthLINC Program

The Rotary Club of Rochester announces its first year of partnership with the YouthLINC program. This program which benefits high-school and college-age youth, our local community, and developing countries with tremendous human service needs.

Founded in 1999, YouthLINC has nearly a decade of experience with international youth service expeditions. For more information, please visit their web site at www.youthlinc.org.

Students accepted into the program commit to volunteering 100 hours in their local community during the 2007-2008 school year. In return for their service, students in the program will receive \$1,000 in Rotary Club sponsorship toward a service experience to a developing country.

We are currently recruiting up to four students into the program this year. Students will be traveling to the Tharaka

District of Kenya from July 22 - August 4, 2008. While in Kenya, the students will work at a children's community center and a new medical clinic. The students from our community will be a part of a larger group of YouthLINC students from across the United States. Rotarians, university instructors, and/or other mentoring professionals, as well as YouthLINC staff will accompany students on international experiences.

2009-2010 ROTARY FOUNDATION AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE

Applications for the 2009-2010 Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships are now available from Rotary District 5960. Please contact the office with questions. Local club deadlines are **April 1**, **2008**. **Required**, inperson interviews will be held **Saturday**, **May 17**, **2008**, in St. Paul, Minn. For further information and to print an application, go to The Rotary Foundation (Foundation Educational Grants) section at http://www.rotary.org/foundation/programs.html (Click on Ambassadorial Scholarships, application in download).

The scholarships which are designed to further international understanding and goodwill, provide for study abroad for one year in one of the 162 countries and 35 geographical regions where Rotary clubs are located. Some 1,200 scholarships will be available from clubs worldwide.

Academic-year Ambassadorial Scholarships are for one academic year abroad and provide funding for round-trip transportation, tuition and fees, room, board, necessary educational supplies, and language training (if necessary) up to a maximum award of \$23,000 or its equivalent.

During their studies abroad, Rotary Foundation ambassadorial Scholars act as "ambassadors of goodwill." Through appearance before Rotary clubs and district, schools, civic organizations, and other forums, the scholars represent their homelands and work to further international understanding.

The Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships Program is the world's largest privately-sponsored international scholarship program. Some \$320 million has been spent on 30,000 international scholarships since the program began in 1947.

Eligibility Criteria:

- All applications must be citizens of a country in which there are Rotary Clubs.
- Applicants must have completed at least two years of college-level coursework or equivalent professional experience before commencing their scholarships studies. Initial application must be made through a Rotary club in the applicant's legal or permanent residence or place of full-time study or employment.
- Candidates cannot be Rotarians, Honorary Rotarians, or employee of a club, district, or other Rotary entity or of Rotary International. Spouses, spouses of lineal descendants, and ancestors (parent or grandparent by blood) of persons in the foregoing categories are also ineligible. Please note that Rotarians and their relatives remain ineligible for scholarship awards for 36 months after a Rotarian has resigned from the club membership.
- Persons with disabilities and members of Rotaract clubs are eligible and encouraged to apply.
- In addition to the criteria listed above, applicants for Academic-Year Ambassadorial Scholarships must be proficient in the language of the proposed country.
