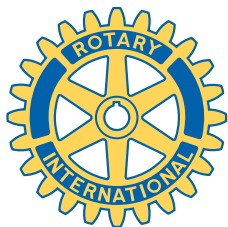

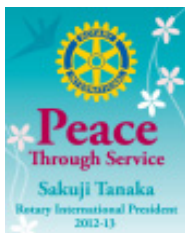

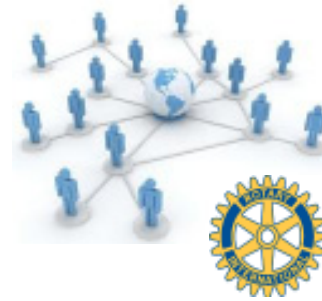
Have you visited the Rochester Rotary Website lately?

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE MAKING AN IMPACT IN KENYA

The Greater Rochester Rotary Club, partnering with the Rotary Club of Rochester, the Rochester Rotary Risers, the Zumbrota Rotary Club, and the Rotary Club of Muthaiga, purchased an ESR machine, with supplies, for the Baraka ("Blessing") Clinic in Mathare Valley, Nairobi, Kenya. The ESR machine measures the erythrocyte sedimentation rate in human blood cells. It is a valuable diagnostic tool, and has the advantage of being small and portable, allowing the management of the clinic to easily transport it should a new clinic location become necessary.

The medical technology enables the determination of inflammation/infection in patients suffering, for example tuberculosis, and other diseases. With this technology, which is in standard usage in laboratories and clinics

around the world, it is easy to monitor the status of patients being treated for infections. It uses an established technology which is safer, requires little blood, and has high accuracy. The requested supplies will permit about 500 measurements of the ESR each month, with materials for one year.



The Baraka Clinic is located in the Mathare valley of Nairobi. It is a slum with a population of about 200,000. Malnutrition, HIV, and other chronic infections including tuberculosis are endemic. The clinic provides outpatient services to about 250 patients each day. The HIV program has about 1,000 patients, treated with medications provided through the Catholic Archdiocese, the German humanitarian organization Aerzte fuer die Dritte Welt, and a variety of other organizations.

In addition, we were able to capitalize on personal connections through Rotary. Dr. Nisha Manek, a member of Rotary in Rochester at the time the project was conceived, is the sister of Jay Manek, who was president of the Muthaiga Club when the project began. Other Rotarians of the Muthaiga Club participated in helping us overcome difficulties posed by fluctuating exchange rates, navigation of the sometimes complex business environment of Kenya, and the delivery of the machine to the Baraka Clinic.

Approximately 12 Rotarians participated in the project. Staff work was done by all nine members of the Southeast Minnesota World Service Committee (a joint committee of the Rotary Club of Rochester, Greater Rochester Rotary, the Rochester Rotary Risers, and Zumbrota Rotary Club). Two members of the Greater Rochester Rotary took the lead on this project.

Members of the host partner, the Muthaiga RC, visited the Baraka Clinic and established relationships with the staff there. They have also hosted clinic staff at one of their meetings. In addition, they helped the American team overcome difficulties posed by fluctuating

exchange rates between US dollars, Euros, and Kenyan shillings, and helped navigate the sometimes complex business environment of Kenya. Members of the Muthaiga club oversaw the purchase of the ESR machine and personally delivered it to the clinic.

Greater Rochester Rotary Club members created an on-line video describing the project to disseminate knowledge about it among the four Rotary Clubs in the South east Minnesota World Service Committee. In addition, the video will be sent to various press outlets in the area to build awareness of the international role that Rotary is playing. The host club in Kenya will also receive access to a digital copy for use as they see fit.

Drs. Ashok Patel, Eric Matteson, and Nisha Manek of the Rotary Club of Rochester will be involved in the activities of the clinic, with a projected medical training series and service to the Baraka Clinic scheduled for January of 2012. This will include seminars on infectious

disease management, and management of chronic lung diseases in this population.

The Baraka Health Centre treats upwards of 250 outpatients each day. The addition of the ERS machine will allow for greater ease and accuracy in treating diseases of the blood. These include tuberculosis and HIV. Even should the clinic be required by the Kenyan government to move, the machine is portable and can be moved to any new location, allowing treatment to continue and improving the public health of this impoverished section of our world.

Baraka Health Centre is run by German Doctors/ Aerzte fuer die 3. Welt. The German Doctors assessed the need and specified the type and nature of the machine required. They will continue to oversee its proper use long into the foreseeable future.

ROTARY COMMITS ADDITIONAL \$75 MILLION TO HELP END POLIO

Rotary International has made a new funding commitment of \$75 million over three years to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI). Rotary, which has already contributed nearly \$1.2 billion to the GPEI, announced the commitment at a 27 September high-level side event on polio eradication, convened by United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon during the United Nations General Assembly in New York.



The side event — “Our Commitment to the Next Generation: The Legacy of a Polio-free World” — brought together leaders of the remaining endemic countries, and representatives of donor governments, development agencies, the GPEI partners, and the media to underscore the urgent need to finish the job of global polio eradication. Although the wild poliovirus is endemic only in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria, other countries are still at risk for re-established transmission of the virus through its “importation” from the endemics.

Ban urged UN member states to ramp up their support for the GPEI, launched in 1988 by Rotary, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The partnership now includes the support of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the United Nations Foundation.

“This decisive moment is a matter of health and justice. Every child should have the right to start life with equal protection from this disease. That’s why I have made eradicating polio a top priority for my second term as Secretary-General,” said Ban.

New donors

“Governments need to step up and honor their commitments to polio eradication if we are to achieve our goal of a polio-free world,” said Wilfrid Wilkinson, chair of The Rotary Foundation. “We are at a true tipping point, with success never closer than it is right now. We must seize the advantage by acting immediately, or risk breaking our pledge to the world’s children.”

“The evidence is clear: if we all do our part, we can and will end this disease. But we must act quickly and give ourselves the very best chance to succeed,” said Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, one of the leading donors to the GPEI. “When we defeat polio, it will motivate us to aim for other great health and development milestones.”

The Islamic Development Bank (IDB), a new donor to the polio eradication effort, announced a US\$227 million loan to Pakistan, which will cover the majority of the country’s polio vaccination campaign costs. The IDB also announced a \$3 million grant for polio activities in Afghanistan.

In addition, Julian Fantino, Canadian Minister of International Cooperation, announced a “Three for One Polio Challenge Initiative” with Rotarians in Canada and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Through the initiative, the Canadian International Development Agency and the Gates Foundation will each contribute to the GPEI C\$1 for every \$1 raised by Canadian Rotarians up to \$1 million. Upon completion, the initiative would generate a total of \$3 million for the GPEI.



These additional funding commitments follow action taken in May by the World Health Assembly, which declared polio eradication a “programmatic emergency for global public health.” Polio cases have plummeted by more than 99 percent since 1988, when the disease infected about 350,000 children a year. Although new polio cases are at an all-time low — fewer than 150 worldwide in 2012 as of 19 September — the \$790 million funding shortfall through 2013 has already curtailed scheduled immunization activities in polio-affected countries. If eradication fails and polio rebounds, up to 200,000 children a year could be paralyzed.

"Failure to eradicate polio is unforgivable, forever. Failure is not an option. No single one of us can bring this long, hard drive over the last hurdle. But together we can," said Dr. Margaret Chan, Director-General of the World Health Organization.

Unwavering commitment

Rotary and its GPEI partners have reached more than 2.5 billion children with the oral polio vaccine, preventing more than 8 million cases of paralysis and hundreds of thousands of pediatric deaths. Rotary's chief responsibilities in the initiative are fundraising and advocacy, an increasingly important role as the polio end game draws near.

Earlier this month, Rotary launched a new website to garner greater support for the global polio eradication

effort. More than 6,000 visitors signed a petition on the site calling for world leaders to commit additional resources to close the funding gap. Wilkinson presented the signatures on Rotary's behalf during the UN polio eradication side event. Visitors to the site can also estimate the potential dollar value they can generate by sharing the polio eradication message through Facebook, Twitter, and other social media.

"The unwavering commitment of Rotary members has been vital to the incredible progress of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative," said Wilkinson. "How critically important it is for the global community to seize this historic opportunity before us to end polio now."
