STRIVE MENTORS NEEDED


Do you have just one hour each month for the next nine months to spend with a local, high school senior? If so, you could be a STRIVE mentor. STRIVE is a mentorship program coordinated by the Rotary clubs of Rochester, connecting positive adults with high school seniors at risk of not graduating. The purpose of STRIVE is to give hope and direction, set goals, improve academics, make friendships, and celebrate accomplishments.

STRIVE students and mentors meet each month at each of the three public high schools. Facilitators lead the group in discussions or activities, community members educate the students about current issues or post-secondary options, and school staff report on students' progress. Students and mentors also enjoy two "Grub Nights," typically at RCTC for food and tours and at Quarry Hill or Bowlocity for food and fun. The program concludes the academic year with a celebration during which students are honored.



SEPTEMBER IS ROTARY'S BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY MONTH

Basic education and literacy is one of Rotary's six areas of focus.

We know that basic education and literacy are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace. Consider these facts:

- If all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths.
- A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.
- If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.
- The world is making good progress in this area. According to a 2014 United Nations Millennium Development Goals progress report, literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing. But pressing global needs remain: 58 million children worldwide are out of school.
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write.

• 781 million adults are illiterate.

WHAT IS CAMP RYLA?

"...One of the goals of Rotary is to help young people develop their leadership abilities and self-confidence to the fullest. To accomplish that goal, Rotary clubs around the world prepare thousands of young leaders through RYLA programs each year.

Camp RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) is a five-day camp which strengthens leadership skills and capabilities of high school students through physical, mental, emotional, and intellectual challenges. There is an emphasis on problem solving, teamwork, and interaction with other outstanding students and volunteer counselors and presenters.

Who can attend?

About 100 high school students are selected each year from southern Minnesota and western Wisconsin by their local Rotary Clubs which pays the tuition for the camp experience.

What are the benefits?

At RYLA, students gain insight into:

- Leadership basics
- Communication
- Problem solving and decision making
- Conflict management and resolution
- Personal strengths
- Community and global citizenship

When and where?

ROTARY ANNOUNCES US \$96.5 MILLION TO END POLIO

Rotary today announced nearly \$100 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio, a vaccine-preventable disease that once paralyzed hundreds of thousands of children each year.

The announcement comes as Nigeria marks two years without any reported cases of wild poliovirus, following four reported cases in 2016.

"The fact that no new cases of wild poliovirus have been detected in Nigeria points to the improved surveillance and rapid response protocols Rotary and its <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>partners have established, particularly in insecure and inaccessible areas," said Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "While this progress is promising, it's time to redouble our efforts so we can continue to maintain the political and financial support necessary to end polio for good."

While significant strides have been made against the paralyzing disease, wild poliovirus is still a threat in parts of the world, with 10 cases in Afghanistan and three cases in Pakistan this year so far. As long as a single child has polio, all children are at risk, which underscores the need for ongoing funding and political commitment to eradication.

To support polio eradication efforts in countries where polio remains endemic, Rotary is allocating the majority of the funds it announced today to Afghanistan (\$22.9 million), Pakistan (\$21.7 million), and Nigeria (\$16.1 million).

Further funding will support efforts to keep 12 vulnerable African countries polio-free:

- Cameroon (\$98,600)
- Central African Republic (\$394,400)
- Chad (\$1.71 million)
- Democratic Republic of the Congo (\$10.4 million)
- Guinea (\$527,300)
- Madagascar (\$690,000)

- Mali (\$923,200)
- Niger (\$85,300)
- Sierra Leone (\$245,300)
- Somalia (\$776,200)
- South Sudan (\$3.5 million)
- Sudan (\$2.6 million)


Africa will also see \$5.8 million in funding for surveillance activities and \$467,800 for technical assistance. Additional funding will go to Bangladesh (\$504,200), Indonesia (\$157,800), Myanmar (\$197,200), and Nepal (\$160,500), with an additional \$96,300 funding surveillance in Southeast Asia. The remainder of the funding (\$6.6 million) will go to the World Health Organization (WHO) for research activities.

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year to be matched 2-to-1 by the <u>Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation</u>, yielding \$450 for polio eradication activities over a three-year period. To date, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion to fight the disease, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio immunization program, PolioPlus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary became a core partner in the Global

Polio Eradication Initiative with the <u>WHO</u>, <u>UNICEF</u>, and the <u>U.S. Centers for</u> <u>Disease Control and Prevention</u>. The Gates Foundation later joined. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to 22 confirmed in 2017.
