GETTING TO KNOW OUR MEMBERS:

PROGRAM:

Ron Ofstead (retired scientist) and Dan Wachtler (retired lawyer) have become aware of a community situation and have taken meaningful action. It is that youth, aged 13 – 24, in the NE metro are facing homelessness without support or shelter. They began with a task force starting with researching already existing support systems and others doing similar work across the Twin Cities. Their project is called, "Finding Home." They determined that approximately 500 youth are considered homeless in the NE metro. Statistically, 13 – 24 is a critical time as it is learned that if intervention occurs before 24, there is hope of a changed life. After 24 the impact lessens and negative patterns begin. They noticed VERY FEW SERV ICES in the NE metro and especially in Washington County. For instance, there is NOT an overnight shelter and there is NOT a daytime drop in any Washington County City.

Youth are homeless for many reasons such as family break-up, medical crisis, aging out of foster care, and LGBTQ status. In fact in MN 20% of the youth homelessness problem comes from children with said status rejected by their families and out on their own. Nationally, the statistic is 30% and in some areas as high as 50% because of their LGBTQ status.

What can we do? Advocacy is the first action possible with new legislative initiatives possible, affordable housing, and bonding bills. Next is the new concept of "host homes" which is volunteer and not through the foster care system. Finally, the last option seems to be a Youth Drop In Center.

Ron and Dan helped to establish a Drop In Center in Oakdale which is now run from 3 – 7 Monday through Friday by Tubman. Tutoring, showering, computers, and basics are available. The site is by Hill Murray High School in their old monastery and it opened June, 2016. There is also a clothes closet called Harriet's Closet and a children's play area and day care. One part time staff has been employed and 25 volunteers run the drop in center.

The current needs are sustainability, supplies, community awareness and engagement, volunteers, and financial support. The problem is that people in Washington County do not see the youth that are homeless because we are so spread out. Kids are isolated and needs are unmet.

Long term, "Finding Home" would like to expand the daytime hours at Tubman to weekends and evenings, have a commercial kitchen to prepare food, and a larger shelter space.

Dan and Ron thanked Sunshine Rotary for their gift to purchase storage shelves at the Drop In Center.
