Playing the role of the Mother Abbess, Jodi Ristau sang "Climb Ev'ry Mountain" in Brookfield Central High School's production of "The Sound of Music." That she had even auditioned for the role was a fluke. Raised in the Bible Belt in Memphis, Tennessee, Jodi sang in church choirs and played piano from a young age, but it wasn't until she was a high school sophomore that her gorgeous soprano voice was discovered.

"When I auditioned, which I did on a whim, the chorus teacher just looked at me and said, 'Why are you not in choir?' She saw something in me I hadn't seen in myself."

The teacher connected Jodi with a private voice instructor and singing became her passion. Upon graduation, however, Jodi was offered a full ride to the University of Memphis to study business. But once again, her teacher stepped in and encouraged her to follow every rainbow, as the song goes, and audition for the vocal music program at the University of Wisconsin–Eau Claire.

"I chose Eau Claire, which just goes to show you that there are people who can pop into your life and completely change its trajectory."

Jodi decided on a double major in music and business but felt that the business program wasn't a good fit for her at the time.

"From my sophomore year on, it was just music and I loved it. I loved studying it. I learned so much about myself and all the transferable skills of vocal performance—being on stage, having a presence, all the things that help you be successful in any role in life."

But in her senior year, Jodi had streams yet to ford. Music, always a beloved escape, had become agonizingly clinical, leading her to the realization that while it would remain a lifelong passion, music would not be her career.

After college, Jodi landed an administrative position in finance through a temp agency, then got her foot in the door at Baird. And finally, just like the song says, she had found her dream.
