Rotary Peace Fellowships Applications Due May 31

Rotary Peace Fellows study at Rotary Peace Centers located in countries other than their own. Through a rigorous program of academic study and practical training, the Rotary Peace Centers develop leaders who become catalysts for peace and conflict resolution in their communities and around the globe. The

program relies on Rotarians to help identify potential candidates, with a goal of selecting approximately 50 master's degree fellows and 50 professional development certificate fellows each year.

The Rotary Peace Centers operate in partnership with seven premier institutions of higher learning. These institutions have changed as the program has evolved.

Candidates have until 31 May to submit applications to their district. Districts must <u>submit</u> <u>endorsed applications</u> to The Rotary Foundation by 1 July. Dear Fellow District 7150 Rotarian,

We have established a District 7150 COVID-19 Response Fund for the purpose of rapidly reimbursing clubs that have initiated COVID-19-related projects in their communities. The District Finance Committee has agreed to seed this fund with known surpluses from the 2020 International Convention and PDG accounts. This, along with several major personal donations from District leaders, gives us a very good start toward our goal of \$10,000 for the fund.

In "traveling" around the District via Zoom, I have found many clubs stepping up to meet the needs of those adversely affected by the pandemic. Food banks, backpack meal programs for students, nursing homes, facemasks, hygiene products..... the needs are real and D7150 Rotarians are finding a way to help.




If it's Monday, It's Rotary Movie Night!





Dear District 7150 Rotarians,

This week's message comes to us from DG Dave Bensley in District 7170 (the Binghamton area):

Art Buchwald, American humorist, once said: "Human beings thrive on action. Stagnation does not wear well with us. We are said to have our origins as hunter-gathers. We run and we chase. We are problem solvers. We must be continuously tested and we continuously test ourselves. And it will not end until our lives end because it is life itself."

We are People of Action. Rotarians do not like to sit around and do nothing. The past few weeks have probably been the hardest weeks most Rotarians have had to live through. We have had to practice social distancing, we've had to stay at home, we've cancelled meeting and we've cancelled training sessions. Rotarians live on social togetherness not distancing.

We have figured out how to make do under the circumstances. In some cases, we have found a way to practice "Service Above Self" in new and innovative ways. Here are some examples of things that are happening in District 7170: Zoom meetings; online social gatherings; donate funds to buy lunches for local grocery store workers, school workers, first responders and emergency medical staff; update club and district websites; offer help getting smaller clubs online; volunteering at local food pantries; participate in Red Cross blood drives: donate to local food banks: shop for elderly neighbors and friends; hold virtual parties for exchange students; connect with older members to be sure they are OK; donate masks, gloves, safety glasses and goggles to hospitals; donate materials to make face masks; donate to restaurants so they can feed medical personnel at reduced price; donate to grocery stores to help with cost of feeding children; order and deliver fruits and vegetables for seniors so they don't have to go to stores; donate to zoos to help feed the animals; deliver prescriptions to elderly; volunteer for Meals on Wheels; provide canned and packaged food to food banks; donate to other charitable organizations; write cards and letters to nursing home residents; writing "Thank You" cards to medical personnel; sew face masks; support school backpack programs; connect with other organizations and governments to find out what is needed; donate to local pharmacies to help with prescription costs.

As you can see, clubs in District 7170 have not "Gone Dark". We are creating many new ways to help our communities, our country and the world. We cannot stand to do nothing. **WE ARE PEOPLE OF ACTION**.

Thanks to DG Dave for sharing and maybe some projects from our neighboring district will inspire you as well!

Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers.

Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers program develops the capacity of peace and development professionals or practitioners to become experienced and effective catalysts for peace. The fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

Since the program began in 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,300 fellows who now work in more than 115 countries. Many serve as leaders in governments, NGOs, the military, education, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and the World Bank.

Our fellowships

The Rotary Peace Fellowship is designed for leaders with work experience in peace and development. Our fellows are committed to community and international service and the pursuit of peace. Each year, <u>The Rotary Foundation</u> awards up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 80 for certificate studies at premier universities.

Choose the program that's right for you:

Master's degree programs

Accepted candidates study peace and development issues with research-informed teaching and a diverse student body. The programs last 15 to 24 months and include a two- to three-month field study, which participants design themselves.

Professional development certificate program

During the one-year program, experienced peace and development professionals with diverse backgrounds gain practical skills to promote peace within their communities and across the globe. Fellows complete field studies, and they also design and carry out a social change initiative.

Application timeline

We are now accepting applications for the 2021-22 Rotary Peace Fellowship program.

Candidates have until 31 May to submit applications to their district. Districts must submit endorsed applications to The Rotary Foundation by 1 July. Learn more about the <u>endorsement</u> <u>process</u>.

Our approach

We see peace not as an abstract concept but as a living, dynamic expression of human development. Peacebuilding is a cornerstone of our mission as a humanitarian service organization, and it is one of our six areas of focus — the channels of activity through which our members make their mark on the world. Our programs, grants and fellowships focus on creating environments where peace can be built and maintained. Rotary believes that if concerned citizens work together to create peace locally, lasting change can happen globally.
