Club donates \$2,800 to COVID-19 response funds

The Rotary Club of Utica recently donated \$1,000.00 to the local COVID-19 Response Fund. The fund is a joint venture between The Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties, Inc. and the United Way of the Valley and Greater Utica. The money was raised through the sale of special edition New York Tough t-shirts, hoodies and coffee mugs. The apparel and mugs were emblazoned with an image designed by local graphic artist and Rotarian, Devon Hoffman, and includes five "word art" messages filling out the outline of New York State, including: "New York Tough"; "Stop The Spread"; "Save Lives"; "One Day At A Time"; and "Together We Can".

This recent donation is part of a total of \$2,800.00 donated so far including a previous \$500.00 donation that went to the local COVID-19 Response Fund.
