Rotarians learn about how Utica Royalties is helping local youth

Utica Rotarians were joined by a number of special guests at last Thursday's meeting, including Hawa Peters, founder and president of Utica Royalties.

Peters was introduced by Rotarian Kevin Marken, who serves as the Utica Director of On Point For College, and is the husband of Utica Rotary Treasurer Darby O'Brien.

Peters, a 34-year-old mother of four and dedicated LPN nurse, was born in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Her early years were deeply impacted by the challenges of a civil war. Faced with adversity, her family sought refuge in the Gambia, where they spent two years in a camp—a testament to the strength of community and the human spirit during challenging times.

In 2001, Peters and her family emigrated to Utica, which she calls a "significant chapter" in their lives.

Peters, a proud graduate of Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC), has earned many accolades, including an On Point for the College Graduate Star Award in 2023, and winning an NAACP award in 2022 for promoting equality and empowering youth.

"These achievements stand as a testament to my unwavering pursuit of knowledge and academic excellence," she says.

In addition to her academic success, Peters has also received the Charles A. Burns Outstanding Adult Continuing Education Student Award in New York.

In October 2021, fueled by a passion for youth development and community empowerment, she founded Utica Royalties. According to its website, Utica Royalties "stands as a beacon of empowerment for the youth in the greater Utica area."
