# PROGRAM SPEAKER There's help for budding entrepreneurs

Want to start a business? There's help available, according to Chris "C.J." Hanrahan, associate business advisor at Mohawk Valley Small Business Development Center.

He discussed the center's free services at the Dec. 15th regular Rotary meeting; among them are:

- Business plan assistance.
- Guidance in applying for loans.
- Market research assistance.
- Economic development and real estate referrals.
- Assistance with minority- and women-owned business certification.
- Government contracting assistance.
- Training events on such topics as "effective marketing", "from employee to entrepreneur", how to



use Quick Books.

They also work with BOCES and colleges on what it takes to start a business, including a business plan competition.

"We're transparent and upfront,"

C.J. said, noting, "Once in a while, we're dream crushers." But the goal is to provide a person with the tools needed to have a better chance of success.

He emphasized that their services are confidential.

Their clients run the gamut – from online to mail order to brick-and-mortar businesses. There have been a lot of people wanting to start restaurants, he said, plus mail-based services and craft makers selling on sites like Etsy.

The Mohawk Valley center, which is affiliated with MVCC, is one of 22 campus-based centers in the state. The local center is housed in MVCC's thINCubator, 326 Broad St., Utica.



### You can change someone's world



Waves come rolling into the bay, lapping the sandy shore and caressing rocky outcroppings along its outer edge. A dense tropical forest borders the beach, with white billowing clouds touching the vast blue above.

It is a paradise in some ways. A place vacationers and other travelers would like to visit. It is a former Portuguese colony -- the Democratic Republic of São Tomé and Príncipe, a two-island nation in the Gulf of Guinea, off the western equatorial coast of Central Africa.

It is also where Franciscan friar Fernando Ventura – a linguist who interprets for the pope and others at the Vatican -- has been immersed in an effort to ameliorate the poverty that persists in the shadow of paradise and to care for orphans and the elderly.

I became friends with Friar Fernando at a meeting in Rome involving some 20

people from around the globe. He was serving as an interpreter. But it became obvious that his real mission, his passion was for the impoverished on the islands. Initially he was invited there to preach a retreat, but upon discovering 70 orphaned and abandoned children in a run-down orphanage, he decided to preach without words.

Friar Fernando and a group of friends established an NGO (non-governmental organization), partnering with other agencies and raising funds.

He puts it this way: "You can't change the world, but you can change someone's world."

It all began with the Milk Bank of São Tomé and Príncipe (Banco de Leite de S. Tomé e Príncipe), an NGO project that Friar Fernando started (www. powderedmilkbank.com). "Together with Continued on next page. Continued from previous page.

a group of friends (including donations from Rotarians in Portugal), we have been providing for the needs of the local orphanage, covering practically 100% of the needs of these 70 kids."

He has another saying: "With small

drops, you can make a river. That's how we got a new orphanage (built with the help of the Portuguese government, several international agencies, and donations from people in a number of countries)."
