# **Utica Rotarians learn about WWII air power**

It was Jan. 23, 1941.

World War II was raging, with Germany controlling most of continental Europe. And the United States was still ten months away from plunging into the fray (thanks to Japan's pending attack on Pearl Harbor).

Nevertheless, the war was on the minds of Utica Rotarians, and with air power playing a key role, perhaps it's not surprising that the club's International Night featured two prominent speakers on the subject.

The printed program reveals that it was a formal affair, held at Hotel Utica, with a multi-course dinner featuring crabmeat cocktail, cream of tomato soup, an entrée of "steak minute, French fried potatoes and green beans in butter," all topped off with "café sundae" and coffee.

A theme emblazoned across

one of the program's pages proclaimed: "He profits most who serves best." It was the original Rotary motto (adopted in 1911).

Club President Burt D. Hawks presided, with Rotarian R.S. Snyder (a dentist) giving the invocation, and Utica Mayor Vincent R. Corrou welcoming everyone. There was even a musical interlude between the speakers.

First up was Air Marshal William Avery Bishop, director of recruiting for the Canadian Royal Air Force, who briefed Rotarians on the "Winged Warfare Over Britain."


Next was some insight on the "Status of the U.S. Air Corps Expansion Program," offered by Brig. Gen. Herbert A. Dargue, assistant chief of the Air Corps.

By the way, Billy Bishop was the top Canadian and British Empire flying ace of World War I. Dargue, a West Point graduate (1907), was one of the original 24 Army aviators (1913).

It appears that at least one Rotarian walked away with a souvenir -- the night's printed program bears the signatures of the air marshal and general.
