The SHP production site is in the Meyda Lighting warehouse in Yorkville.





President Tina Pavlot kicked off the 14th meeting of the club's 107th year with an inspiring message in honor of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.:

"Life's most persistent and urgent question is: what are you doing for others?"

"I love America."

That was the first of two statements that provide a glimpse of the life of Hanka Grabovica, a new Rotary member and the guest speaker for the Jan. 19th program meeting.

Immigrating at the age of 16, Hanka noted that she was the first in her family to learn English so she could help her parents and brother navigate the adjustment to life in the United States. War broke out in her native Bosnia when she was 6 years old, thus ending what she described as her "happy life." The family had to flee the fighting, plunging them into years of fear and insecurity.

But her take-charge attitude as a new teenager in America made her determined to get an education and pursue a career as an educator – not to mention immersing herself in ways to give back to the community. Thus, she has served on various boards, including being president of the Bosnian American Association.

"I'm a person who believes in giving back and making a difference in my community – just like when I needed help when I first came here."

Her second defining statement is perhaps equally as simple yet telling:

"I love what I do."


