Social Studies Teacher Peter Anderson looked out at the audience of Rotarians, students and teachers and likely had a moment of déjà vu. He mentioned how as a student he had the honor of speaking before Rotarians and then nominating a teacher as an outstanding educator. It wouldn't be surprising if he remembered the qualities he saw in a good teacher because here he stood years later getting the award himself.

Anderson, who teaches at New Hartford High School, was one of seven educators honored by the Rotary Clubs of Utica, New Hartford, North Utica-Whitestown and Sauquoit last Thursday at Five Points Public House/ Irish Cultural Center.

Outstanding Educators Chairman Bart Gorman explained that the Utica Rotary's tradition of having high school students attend meetings dates back to the mid-1940s.

He added that the current 'Outstanding Educators' effort is "a direct evolution of Rotary's decades of commitment to the welfare of children and the enrichment of educational opportunities for all."

"The students who came and spoke at our [Rotary clubs'] meetings were exceptional," Iannone added. "They are a testament to the work you are doing daily. It is true that the work starts at home.
