Gala spotlights Reed, Loftus and Stanley restoration

The Rotary Club of Utica, celebrating 110 years of service to the community, honored Earle Reed and Peter Loftus with the prestigious "Service Above Self" Award at this year's annual Gala. The black-tie event took place on Friday, June 6, 2025, at the historic Stanley Theatre in Downtown Utica.

Sponsored by Hage & Hage LLC, the "Service Above Self" Gala served as a fundraiser for the Stanley Theatre, supporting the thoughtful restoration of a space that will enhance the theatre's capacity to host pre-show gatherings and post-show celebrations. The restoration will preserve its historic charm while enriching the patron experience.

The Gala shone a spotlight on Earle Reed and Peter Loftus, whose remarkable contributions to the community embody Rotary's enduring commitment to "Service Above Self."

Reed, founder of the renowned Utica Boilermaker Road Race, is widely recognized not only

Proctor Theatre Guild at Grace Church. Through his artistic direction and dedication to local theatre, he has created beloved traditions that have brought joy to thousands while mentoring young performers and cultivating a deep appreciation for the performing arts.

"Earle Reed and Peter Loftus represent the very best of what it means to serve a community," said Joe Caruso, Utica Rotary "Service Above Self" Award chairperson. "Whether through civic leadership or the arts, they've each created lasting legacies that continue to uplift and inspire."

Rotary Clubs honor outstanding educators

The Rotary Clubs of Utica, New Hartford, North Utica/Whitestown, and Sauquoit honored seven Utica-area teachers at their annual Outstanding Educators Awards Luncheon, held Thursday, June 5, at Five Points Public House/ Irish Cultural Center in Utica. The program was hosted by Rotary Club of Utica and its **Outstanding Educators Program** Chair Bart Gorman. It is an annual event of the area Rotary Clubs' community service committees. The 2025 recipients of the Outstanding Educators Awards are:

• Norin Lavender, a music and band teacher at Clinton Central High School.

• Mark McFarland, a math teacher and sports coach at New

Hartford High School.

• Tim Papienuk, an English teacher at New York Mills Junior/ Senior High School.

• Kagan Crawford, a history teacher at Notre Dame Junior/Senior High School.

• Jeffery Brown, a chemistry teacher at T.R. Proctor High School.

• Amanda Hartnett, a chemistry teacher at Sauquoit Valley High School.

• Stephen Costanza, a chemistry teacher at Whitesboro Central High School.

The awards program comes at the culmination of a year-long program during which area Rotary clubs hosted two students from each of seven area high schools. The students had an opportunity to introduce themselves to the Rotary members, and to learn about Rotary's community, regional and international service, which are the fulfillment of the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self."

At the end of the school year, the students from each school are asked to select the teacher whom they believe exemplifies the Rotary motto, and the values of Rotary, as exemplified in its Four Way Test:

- Is it the Truth?
- Is it Fair to all concerned?
- Will it build Goodwill and better Friendships?
- Will it be Beneficial to all concerned?



There's chemistry between students and good teachers

One recipient of the Outstanding Educator Award, Kagan Crawford, is a brand-new teacher who decided to pursue a career in education after serving in Afghanistan with the U.S. Army. His history students at Notre Dame High report that he says he likes to talk and now he gets paid to do it.

Another honoree, Jeffery Brown, began his career as a chemist at a brewery and found a teaching path instead after getting into coaching sports. His subject at Proctor High? Chemistry, of course.

There must be something about

chemistry teachers that inspire students because Brown wasn't the only one to be honored. There also were Amanda Hartnett of Sauquoit Valley High School and Stephen Costanza of Whitesboro Central High.

Hartnett revealed that "teaching is like herding cats" because her chemistry students are "observant and curious and bring great joy."

Costanza, his students claim, prioritizes understanding rather than just moving ahead with a lesson. "He provides real-life examples" and "all the tools needed to be the best."

"A coach and mentor" is how stu-

dents describe New Hartford High School math teacher Mark McFarland, who also coaches boys and girls varsity ssports. "He's available to help" and he likes to remind students to "never settle for less than the best."

New York Mills English teacher Tim Papienuk found students and staff rallying around him when he was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer, and students decided to return the motivation by providing inspirational quotes for him to read when he was receiving cancer treatments. His inspiration also resulted in him being selected as a Rotary Outstanding Educator for a second time. "All I need," he quipped, "is one more" to match three-time NFL Most Valuable Player "Tom Brady."

There was one final honoree whom Clinton High students describe as living "Service Above Self" because, instead of being present to accept his award, music teacher Norin Lavender was back at school conducting band rehearsal for that evening's concert.

They add: "He never discourages anyone from doing something hard."
