# Helping others realize their dreams

Elvisa Alikadic, who heads up the Community Wellness Program, was the guest speaker of Thursday's meeting. She noted that her son, Medin, at the age of 14, decided to start a community program to keep his friends in sports for exercise, off video games for mental health, and out of trouble in general.

It was a great success, but even working two jobs, Medin didn't have the financial means for the program to be sustainable and asked his mother for help. Together they traveled around to speak to community members, including Chet Locanti of the Utica Rec Center, who loved Medin's idea.

The result: A four-hour weekend program (during the times when statistically most young men get into trouble) that had become very popular, with 80 kids attending. Recently elected Utica Mayor Mike Galime asked Alikadic to expand the program, which has resulted in the Community Wellness Program. The program, in its new form, is open to all people regardless of age from Thursday to Sunday, 4 to 8 p.m.

"It's the community taking



care of the community," she said of the program, which is funded through donations.

Alikadic hopes to increase scholarship opportunities through the program and put kids in touch with mentors who can help guide them.

"A lot of kids are afraid to have dreams because they fear they won't be able to realize them," she said. "Even if there is one kid we can put on the right track. then it would be a success."

Alikadic, a licensed social

worker, is very involved in the community. She is the Director of the Neighborhood Center's Community Mental Health Promotion and Support (COMHPS) program and sits on several boards including the Bosnian American Business Association where she oversees the Scholarship Committee; the Oneida County Multicultural Board where she is an advisor for the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion interests of the board, and the Dominican Cultural Association of which she is a founder and advisor.

Another goal she has for the Community Wellness Program is to, "Connect the community to all of the great people and resources our community has."

They have several upcoming programs for Easter, and they are always looking for volunteers, including tutors to help attendees with their school work.
