

Consummate volunteer to receive 'Service Above Self' award

Rotary Club of Utica will honor semi-retired banker and consummate volunteer James M. Hamer Sr. with the 2023 *Service Above Self Award*.

Jim will receive the award at the Service Above Self Gala on June 9.

The Utica native has a long tenure with the area's banking community. After 20 years with Marine Midland, he went on to become chief commercial loan officer with Savings Bank of Utica and then senior vice president of loans with Adirondack Bank.

"But," as his nominee puts it, "where James gets his powerful momentum from, is through his true calling. Volunteering. Diagnosed with cancer since 2017, Jim continues to serve his community tirelessly by example, day in and day out. He is still currently working at the young age of 74, at the downtown branch of Pathfinder Bank here in Utica. He is constantly working on countless projects for the betterment of others and the advancement of our area youth and elderly. Jim is faithfully a self-sacrificing individual who has given so much of himself throughout his life to the Central New York region and our beloved City of Utica. He is a a true inspiration to all who have had the pleasure to share stories with him."

Passion for HealthFriends began after cancer battle

Chip Hemmel came to Health-Friends in 2017 after 30 years of experience as a manager and executive officer of insurance and financial service companies. As to why, he shared a story about his wife's cancer battle at the May 18th program meeting.

When his wife, Betsy, was undergoing a course of chemotherapy treatment, they got to know other women in the treatment room, including one who seemed to be showing more pain and fear, who "seemed to be suffering for them all."

They discovered that she and her husband owned a small family farm and had very basic health insurance. "So, confronted with having to pay hundreds of dollars for pain medication the others received for a small co-pay, she did without it."

He added: "We received the best care and medications available because we had a comprehensive health insurance plan, easily obtaining the newer, better, pain medication for \$25 per month, rather than \$109 per pill retail price our friend would have to pay."

When Betsy's treatments ended, he said, "I was determined to find a way to help our new friend and the many like her. That's how I found out about HealthFriends."

He gave a history, noting that "Mohawk Valley Network, the Catholic Diocese of Syracuse and Catholic Charities of Ilion secured funding and a Community Foundation grant to open HealthFriends on August 2nd, 1999." The focus was on providing pharmaceuticals, and dental and primary care for children.

The following is in his own words:

Just to share one story; 6 weeks after the world shut down, I received a call from a friend who is a nurse at St. Elizabeth's. She had a patient in the ER who came in because she'd lost her job and health insurance due to COVID. So, she didn't pick up her medicines and had ended up in the hospital. Why? Because without a drug plan, she was looking at a cost of \$46,882... per month!

With the help of that nurse, some local doctors, a local pharmacy and calls to several manufactures, we were able to get 3 months of her medicines for \$1133. We paid \$1000, the local pharmacy, who'd already cut their profit to nothing, absorbed the additional \$133. It took us 9 days to put the deal together but it gave this woman three months to find a longer term solution.

That's the kind of work that takes up most of our time to this day. And with COVID...My one employee and two volunteers retired and never came back. So, since January 2021, I and one volunteer (working 4 hours per week) have been providing the assistance.

We continue to provide enrollment advice, referral support, and direct payments for approximately 750 people per year; referring about 400 of them to navigators and foundations established to treat specific needs; while purchasing emergency supplies of over 3000 medications for the other 350.

Between August of 1999 and December of 2021, we'd helped over 19,904 individuals, obtain 51,087 medicines at a cost of \$1,702,150 valued at over \$15,000,000. At the same time, we've helped and referred another 18,000+ clients to programs that target specific diseases and conditions.
