Joseph Abraham will be honored as a Paul Harris Fellow and Clyde Vanderpool will receive the Quiet Giver Award at June 7's 'Service Above Self' Gala at the Stanley Theatre.

Joseph has been a Utica Rotarian since June 2023. He transferred from the Liberty, NY club after he moved to the area to start a position in the Communications and Marketing Department at SUNY Polytechnic Institute, where he leads the university's media relations and internal communication efforts. Prior to his move to the Mohawk Valley, Joseph was the managing editor of the *Sullivan County Democrat*, a twice-weekly newspaper, leading their editorial team and managing 50-plus special publications. He also won a New York Press Association Award for his coverage of the Sullivan County Legislature in 2021.

Since joining the Rotary Club of Utica, Joseph has become a member of several committees and assists with the club's external communications, whether it is helping with social media, writing content for the newsletter or constructing and sharing press releases with local media. He is also a member of CNY Rotary's Public Image Committee. Joseph is a firm believer in the Rotary motto of 'Service Above Self,' and that one finds the greatest joy and satisfaction in life from helping others.

Clyde Vanderpool has been a member of the Rotary Club of Utica for the last three years. Linda shares incoming RI president's inspiration

Inspiration and Rotary themes were on the mind of President Linda Iannone as she opened the last regular program meeting on May 16.

Quoting English novelist and poet Emily Brontë, she said:

"May is the month of expectation, the month of wishes, the month of hope." She added: "As we are inspired by this year's Rotary theme to Create Hope, look around our local community to see how you can create hope for someone this month."

And then she reported that Rotary International President-elect Stephanie Urchick revealed her 2024-2025 theme, The Magic of Rotary, at the International Assembly.

"Don't misunderstand me – we are not going to end polio or bring peace to the world by waving a wand and saying some funny words," she quoted Urchick.

"It's up to you. You create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member."

Urchick, a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA, was inspired by the magic of Rotary when she was helping install water filters in the Dominican Republic. Two boys were watching as dirty water entered the filter, then ran out clean at the other end.

"One of the boys grabbed my sleeve and said, 'Show me the magic again'," Urchick said.

"Obviously, the water filter wasn't magic. We worked hard to transport those filters, install them, and work with community leaders in the area to maintain them. But those boys knew that easy access to clean water would change their lives."
