This week's program: SHP's beds for kids

This Thursday's program features Steve Sperbeck, Utica chapter president of *Sleep in Heavenly Peace* (SHP), which provides beds for children in need.

Steve is also general manager of Erl Intermodal Corp., a local trucking company that services the ports of NY/NJ with 60 trucks and 70 employees.

SHP Utica was started over a year ago on August 22. That first day the team build six beds, and started delivering beds locally on September 1.



"Since that first delivery, we have now delivered 700 beds to our community," Steve notes. "Each bed has a value of \$250 so that is a \$175,000 give-back to our community."

Steve is a hockey fan (Utica Comets season ticket holder). His favorite baseball and football teams are the Yankees and the Cowboys.

He lives in Frankfort with wife Lisa and daughter Celena. Steve spent 25 years in the volunteer fire service and was chief of Frankfort Hill VFC for five years.

PRIDE OF WORKMANSHIP AND WOMEN ROTARIANS

A bit of history from Norm Kolb

PP Norm Kolb, a retired Utica Rotary member living in Virginia, called the editor to say how much he enjoyed keeping up with Rotary news via the club newsletter – and that he especially liked the story behind the Pride of Workmanship Award in the Oct. 24th issue.

Offering a bit of history, Norm gave credit to long-time Rotarian Stu Williams, who was president (1990-91) when the club launched the Pride of Workmanship program, and then Norm reminisced about his tenure as club president (1987-88).

"The thing I was most proud of when I was president, we brought in the first women (Rotarians)," despite some male grumbling. It was important, he said, for the future of Rotary.

To continue this historical jaunt, the first woman president of Utica Rotary was Linda Allen (1998-99). She was followed by Georgiana Roberts Ide in 2002-03, Darby O'Brien in 2004-05, Angela VanDerhoof in 2012-13, Pam Matt in 2013-14, Jill Koch in 2017-18, and our current president, Tina Pavlot, whose theme, "Imagine Rotary," coincides with that of Jennifer Jones, first female president of Rotary International.

Jennifer imagines a Rotary where members act to make their dreams become reality, advance diversity and inclusion, create a welcoming club experience, empower girls, and expand Rotary's reach.

As Norm said, it's the future of Rotary.

WHO WAS FIRST?

Who was the first-ever female president of a Rotary club?

That honor goes to Dr. Sylvia Whitlock of Duarte, California (1987-88). Armed with a PhD in education and a master's in marriage and family therapy, Dr. Whitlock served as an educator for 40 years before beginning a second career as a family therapist.

A multiple Paul Harris Fellow and benefactor, Sylvia has supported an orphanage in Mexico, sunk wells in Nigeria and raised nearly \$90,000 to educate girls in India.

At the urging of Rotarians and friends, she eventually wrote a book describing the history of Rotary admitting women to its membership.



Bowlers raise over \$8,000 to help eradicate polio

Rotarians from four clubs hurled balls down the lanes last week, sending pins flying and raising more than \$8,000 for Polio Plus.

The 4th Annual Pin Down Polio event was held Oct. 26 at Vista Lanes in Yorkville during the week of World Polio Day (Oct. 24). Over 65 bowlers and guests participated, representing four Area 2 and 3 clubs

– Utica, North UticaWhitestown, New Hartford,
and Sauquoit.

Co-Chairs Stephen
Turnbull (Utica Rotary) and
Stephen Karboski (North
Utica-Whitestown Rotary)
reported that the event itself
brought in \$2,762, and with
2-for-1 matching funds from
the Bill and Melinda Gates

Foundation, the actual total raised was \$8,286.
