Remembering Angela VanDerhoof

In sharing the sad news of the passing of long-time Rotarian Angela VanDerhoof, Past Treasurer Darby O'Brien reports that Angela joined Rotary in 1990 and was our president in 2012-2013. She received our club's first Quiet Giver's Award in 2004 and a Paul Harris Fellowship in 2013.

In addition, President-Elect Heather Beebe pulled an old write-up on Angela, created to honor her in August 2017 when the club was running the "Rotarian of the Week" series.

Here it is.

Week 8 of our Utica Rotarian of the Week profile series turns the spotlight on a club past president, Angela VanDerhoof. Angela was born in Utica to a "very large, loving Italian family in east Utica", with close houses making for a close-knit neighborhood. As a child of World War II, Angela caught the volunteer bug early on, participating in many drives and collection for the war effort. Time outside the classroom was spent in a wide range of activities, from drama club, math club, Red Cross club to summer splashing at Buckley pool in Utica.

On the academic front, Angela was an overachiever and role model. She left school at age 16 to attend college, the first of her family generation to do so. Considering that her mom had 13 siblings and dad had 7, with oodles of cousins, this was quite an accomplishment. At Alfred U. Angela attended the Washington Semester, a specialized program in government, was a dorm RA, and sorority sister. The world opened up for her in college, as Angela met people from many cultures and places not known to her. This journey of discovery has continued throughout her career and volunteer experience.

Lest you think that young Angela spent all her waking hours at Alfred huddled in a library carrel, she will concede that she and her fellow sorority sisters would on occasion use the accepted public transportation of the time (hitchhiking) to seek parties serving legal beverages. You see, Alfred was a Seventh Day Adventist town, and proper weekend entertainment



required creativity.

After a stint as a History and English teacher at Proctor High (her alma mater), Angela was called to what would become the cornerstone of a long career of service to a population in need. "I thought I knew a lot about the demands of earning a living, raising a family etc - and I did. But, I never really knew about the breadth of same faced by individuals with disabilities and the challenges of their family members." As CEO of the ARC, Angela led a transformation of that agency and the level of service available to individuals with disabilities and their families. She will be the first to admit that the organization's success was made possible with a team approach – "no one person can do it" – but certainly without Angela's leadership over the years the ARC would not likely have the depth and breath of programs serving thousands in our region.

For 55 years Angela VanDerhoof has brought her expertise to local, regional and national boards of directors, and volunteered for many organizations. Upon her retirement five years ago, she served out her terms on all, with the exception of Utica Rotary. How lucky we are to have PP Angela VanDerhoof as a Utica Rotarian.

Noted Heather: "We must recognize now how lucky we have been to have her ripple effects continue to pass through the working hands of many of our current Rotarians of whom she was such a great mentor."
