
New Member Proposed: Rebecca Cavoli

One freezing cold, wintery day, my father came rushing home from work and told us, my sister and brothers, to get all our small coats, hats, gloves, boots, whatever winter gear/clothes we had that we weren't using, as several of the Conkling School children didn't even have a warm winter coat to go to school in. He gathered it all and put it in front of his pizzeria in a box and told all the kids that would come through to get what they needed. I learned from that very early age that although we may not have as much as some, we had more than most and it is important to share, be grateful and give back whenever and wherever you can. That is truly how I try to live my life to this day."



Rebecca is "married to my love, Dale Cavoli," and is a mom to three sons.

My oldest son, Lorenzo, is 26 years old and a graduate of Siena College. My middle son, Giovanni, is 23 and a graduate of The University of Miami. Both now live and work locally. Then lastly, my youngest son is 13 years old and is in the 8th grade at Whitesboro Middle School. My boys and our dog, Astro, are my everything."

She adds: "I love to cook, a good book, a good meal, to get involved, anything that glitters and sparkles, and my favorite color is pink."

Why was the library so tall? Because it had a lot of stories.

The pun is fitting in many ways for Utica Rotary Treasurer and former library director Darby O'Brien because if her years of service and memories were to be measured in books, you might not find a library tall enough to hold them.

A native of Rome, Darby returned to the Mohawk Valley in 1990 to become the director of the Utica Public Library after previously working at public libraries in New Jersey and at university libraries in New Jersey and Connecticut. She would serve in that role for over 26 years, improving the services to public libraries in Herkimer, Madison and Oneida Counties. in a collaborative effort with the Mid-York Library System, where our club currently holds its twice-monthly meetings.

Her service through the library, Rotary and other volunteer endeavors earned her a

prestigious recognition from the Oneida County History Center in 2015, when she was inducted as a Richard W. Couper Living Legend.
