A Message from District Governor Ken Fleeson

Wow, where did September go? We are having fun visiting the clubs and learning about all the good they do for their communities. We are also having a blast attending club community service activities and look forward to many more.

The other great part of making the club visits is taking in all of the natural beauty of the countryside of our district and stopping from time to time to visit a State Park or attraction that I never knew existed. A great example is Kinzua State Park in Mt. Jewett. In 2003 a tornado took out the center portion of the Kinzua Viaduct, which was once the longest and tallest railroad structure at 2,053 feet long and 301 feet high over the Kinzua Gorge. In 2011 the state established a state park on the site and preserved a portion of the bridge. You can walk 600 feet out on the remaining support towers and gaze into the gorge as well as still see the support towers that were toppled as a result of the tornado. Amazing how we will travel hundreds or thousands of miles on vacation to see other parts of the country and totally ignore what sits in our own back yard.

With the help of retired State Trooper Matt Harris, Crawford Central has been identified as the school district our 7280 District Peace Project will sponsor for the *Troopers Teaching Students* program. Once we have the funding secured, we can discuss with the school district which of the five elementary schools will be the most in need of this groundbreaking character development program.



Crawford Central School District and Proximate Rotary Clubs

Crawford Central has nearly 3,800 students from the City of Meadville, the Borough of Cochranton, Vernon, Union, West Mead, Fairfield, East Fairfield and Wayne Townships. The school district's central location and geographic dispersion gives lots of Clubs in our District a sense of kinship with it.

Matt is so excited to partner with Rotary that he has pledged to shift some other grant funding to support us, thus **reducing our annual sponsorship cost by \$4,000 to \$22,000**. The purpose of the program is for students to learn positive character traits and to learn to respect and trust law enforcement officers. Serving State Troopers will work with the students every week for the full 2020-21 school year. This character building program directly supports 4 of RI's 6 areas of focus: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution, Maternal and Child Health; Basic Education and Literacy; and Economic and Community Development. Rotary encourages us to wage peace at the Community, Club, District, and International levels. This program supports our larger Community through the generosity of all of our Clubs for a District-wide project. We need to have all the funding in place by July 2020 to implement the program in the selected elementary school for Fall 2020. Nearly 800 million people live on less than \$1.90 a day. As Rotary members we are passionate about providing sustainable solutions to poverty. While I know we have a tremendous need in our local communities, we have networks and programs that offer food and other assistance to those in need. For many others across the world, such programs do not exist.

Through our support of the Rotary Foundation, we can help make an impact in those areas that are far less fortunate. We create opportunities to help individuals and communities thrive financially and socially. In addition, Rotary members train people to become resources for their community, offer networking activities, advise on new business development, and mathematics and financial management training.

Through microloans, individuals can learn to be entrepreneurs to become street vendors, rickshaw drivers, weavers and tailors. For example, in Ecuador, Rotary members helped grant more than 250 microloans and trained more than 270 community members in sewing, baking, plumbing, microcredit, business management and leadership. In West Cameroon, Rotary members gave farmers the skills needed to improve soil fertility, control of soil erosion, and market their produce.

There's an old saying, usually attributed to Confucius that goes something like "Give a man a fish, and you'll feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you've fed him for a lifetime. Though our support of the Foundation, Rotary can teach individuals to "fish" as well as provide the fishing rod.

WORLD POLIO DAY IS OCTOBER 24TH



World Polio Day is a day on which we celebrate the progress made in the campaign to rid the world of Polio. On October 24th, Rotary will be hosting an online Global update on Facebook. For those individuals or clubs that would like to join the update please visit the Rotary International Facebook page to RSVP for the event.

While huge gains have been made in the eradication of Polio worldwide, there is still a lot of work that still needs to be done. Year to date there have been a total of 78 new Wild Polio Virus outbreaks with sixteen of these in Afghanistan and 62 in Pakistan. This compares to a total of thirty-three outbreaks of the Wild Polio Virus for the entire year of 2018 with 21 and 12 in Afghanistan and Pakistan respectively.

During the month of October, we encourage clubs to consider hosting a World Polio Day event, dedicate a club meeting to learning more about the need to continue the campaign, and/or have a fundraiser dedicated to the End Polio campaign. In addition to World Polio Day, I recommend that everyone take a few minutes and read pages 30 - 49 of the October 2019 Rotarian. This is a wonderful article about PolioPlus with examples of the unexpected outcomes that have been realized through Rotary's efforts to eradicating polio to help many more individuals and communities. In several instances, these unexpected outcomes fit in with "Economic and Community Development Month".

On a related topic, some of you may have heard about a recent outbreak of Polio in the Philippines along with a second case pending confirmation from the World Health Organization. When originally reported these outbreaks were linked to the Wild Polio Virus. Upon further investigation, these outbreaks have been confirmed as the circulating vaccine-derived polio virus type 2 (cVDPV2). No cases of wild poliovirus have been discovered, and the Philippines' polio-free status is not at risk.

While we are saddened by this news and for the child, especially as Rotary approached the 40 year anniversary of the first immunization project in the Philippines in 1979, it is important to remember that cVDPVs are extremely rare and only occur in under-immunized communities. Vaccination coverage in the Philippines has been steadily declining over the past few years, and the case reported underscores how critical it is to increase vaccination coverage to at least 95% of children to stop the future spread of polio.

Rotary and our partners are working with counterparts and public health authorities in the Philippines to strengthen surveillance and support immunization responses in the coming weeks and months. In addition, on September 20, 2019, the 10 District Governors in the Philippines signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Health to work together to ensure success of the upcoming polio immunization campaign.
