Introduction

This document has been prepared for any past, current and future members of the Rotary Club of Mount Horeb. The ultimate goal of this document is to assist with providing Club information to new members, help existing members attend to the operations of the Club and provide future members a source for information about our Club.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the action we take in the world.

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

To encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society:
- THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

THE FOUR-WAY TEST

A nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. The test has been translated into more than 100 languages, and Rotarians recite it at club meetings:

Of the things we think, say or do:

Is it the TRUTH?

Is it FAIR to all concerned?

Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

AVENUES OF SERVICE

We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the foundation of club activity.

- Club Service focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.
- Vocational Service calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society
- Community Service encourages every Rotarian to find ways to improve the quality of life for people in their communities and to serve the public interest.

- International Service exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more.
- Youth Service recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professionals through leadership development programs such as Rotaract, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards and Rotary Youth Exchange.

Our 1.2 million-member organization started with the vision of one man—Paul P. Harris. The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member.

A LITTLE MOUNT HOREB ROTARY HISTORY

Early in December 1938, a group of Stoughton Rotarians brought the idea of Rotary to Mount Horeb. A small group of local businessmen assembled in the Mount Horeb Bank, at which time John Bjoin, President of the Stoughton Rotary Club, assisted by Frank Chapin and J. MacCulver, briefly presented the idea of Rotary International.

In April 1939, these same Rotarians made personal calls on other businessmen and received a very friendly response so that a sufficient number of signatures were obtained for a charter. In this manner, Rotary Clubs are organized throughout the world. Mount Horeb Rotary's Charter Night was held May 3, 1939, with the Stoughton and Edgerton Clubs in attendance. The charter members of the club were: Werner Wuethrich, Ralph Fossage, Sever Martinson, Owen Sharer, Jesse Lauderdale, Andrew Rude, Ben Mavis, Rapheal Vasen, Irvin Hoff, Truman Dunlap, Isaac Myrland, Melvin Wendt, L. J. Kranzfelder, Grant Hustad and Fr. J. M. Hausler. Werner Wuethrich was elected as the first president of the Mount Horeb Rotary Club.

The members of the Mount Horeb club celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the club at a gala held Wednesday, June 28, 1989. The guest of honor was the only surviving charter member, Ralph Fossage. All past presidents and former club members over the past 50 years were invited.

ROTARY STRUCTURE

In order to carry out its service programs, Rotary is structured at club, district and international levels.

- At the Club Level: The Mount Horeb Rotary Club is club number 2706 and is a member of District 6250. The Rotary Club is the basic unit of Rotary activity, and each club determines its own membership. Each club meets weekly, usually at a mealtime on a weekday in a regular location, where members can enjoy fellowship, discuss club business and hear guest speakers. Each club also conducts various service projects within its local community, participates in special projects involving other clubs in its district and occasionally engages in a special project with a "sister club" in another nation. Most clubs also hold social events at least quarterly. Each club elects its own president and officers from among its active members. Each officer serves a one-year term. The clubs enjoy considerable autonomy within the framework of the standard constitution and bylaws of Rotary International. The governing body of the club is the Club Board, consisting of the club president (who serves as the Board chairman), the president-elect, secretary, treasurer, and at least two at-large directors. In the majority of clubs, the immediate past president is also a member of the board.
- At the District Level: A Rotary district is led by a district governor who oversees the operation of the clubs in the district. The district governor is an officer of Rotary International and he/she represents the Rotary International board of directors in the field. Each governor is nominated by the clubs of the district, and elected to a one-year term by electors from each club who meet at the district's annual conference. The district governor appoints assistant governors from among the Rotarians of the district to assist in the management of Rotary activity. Assistant Governors help the district and district governor by reaching out to their assigned group of local clubs to help with all things Rotary within the District. Rotary districts are further grouped into Rotary Zones. Mt. Horeb Rotary Club is part of group 11.
- At the Zone Level: The Rotary Zone structure is a regional cluster of districts first established in 1939 to clarify the procedures for nomination of directors and elections of officers of Rotary International (RI). In 2017, RI re-structured the Zones, a process that occurs every 8 years. District 6250 belongs to Zone 28.
- At the Rotary International Level: Rotary International is governed by a board of directors composed of the International President, the President-Elect, the General Secretary, and the 17 Zone directors. The nomination and the election of each president takes place during the one to-three-year period before he/she takes office, and is based on requirements including geographical balance among Rotary zones and the individual's previous service as a district governor and Rotary International board member. The international board meets quarterly to establish policies, to make recommendations to the various governing bodies, to oversee the RI Council on Legislation and to organize the RI Convention.

MEMBERSHIP CATEGORIES

- Active Membership: members participate in all club activities, attend meetings and pay dues. Membership in the Mt. Horeb Club includes membership in the Rotary Districe 6250 and Rotary International. Dues to Mt. Horeb Rotary Club includes the dues to District and International.
- An individual membership number is assigned to each new member by Rotary International.
- Receipt of a monthly subscription to The Rotarian magazine.
- Receipt of Norsk News weekly newsletter/meeting notes from each regular club meeting.
- Benefit of use of our Club's Mount Horeb Chamber of Commerce Membership.
- \$100 yearly contribution to the Rotary International Foundation for Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY). Full participation of Mt. Horeb Club members qualify our Club to participate in District and RI grant programs.

SPONSORSHIP OF A MEMBER

When you sponsor a new member, it is your responsibility to be a mentor and to help them feel comfortable in the club. Be available to answer any and all questions. If you are not very knowledgeable about Rotary, ask another member to help you with the sponsorship roll. Prospective Rotarians are required to attend three of our Club meetings, as our guest, before applying for membership. Our club will pay for their meals during these three visits. *Rotary International does make note of and keep track of the sponsors/mentors for new members, so this function is very important*

FIRESIDE CHAT

The Fireside Chat is an annual tradition that has endured over the years as a fun, welcoming, social activity that provides new members with a history of the Club and an explanation of the various opportunities for involvement. Usually hosted in a club member's house, this is an entertaining, yet informal way to learn about community and international projects, club activities and find common interests.

EVERY 5TH WEDNESDAY

The Mount Horeb Rotary Club takes advantage of months with 5 Wednesdays to do something fun and different on the last Wednesday of the month. The Social committee is responsible for coordinating and setting up the event associated with the 5th Wednesday.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL AND DISTRICT 6250 EVENTS:

ROTARIANS AT WORK DAY:

Rotarians At Work Day happens the last Saturday in April each year. Started in 2006
as a joint effort between two Rotary Districts (one in the United States and one in
Mexico), Rotarians at Work Day continues to grow. Each year, clubs around the world
identify a hands-on project that all members can participate in to help their local
community.

CONFERENCES/CONVENTIONS:

- There are two major conferences annually. The District 6250 Conference is usually held in the home city of the District Governor. It pulls together club members from throughout the district for fellowship and knowledge. It is a good time for all. All members are encouraged to attend. See appendix #1 for current information.
- INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE: The International Conference is held in the country
 of the current President of Rotary International. The Rotarian magazine and Rotary
 International website have information on this annual conference.

THE MOUNT HOREB ROTARY FOUNDATION:

- The Mount Horeb Rotary Foundation was founded in 2005 and is a not-for-profit entity
 that supports the efforts of the Mount Horeb Rotary Club. The MH Rotary Foundation
 was created by the MH Rotary Club, and is not associated with The Rotary
 International Foundation. The goal of the MH Rotary Foundation is to accumulate
 capital sufficient
 to (one day) completely fund the Club's high school scholarship program from the
 interest earned.
- The Mount Horeb Rotary Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization that allows contributions to be made on behalf of the Mount Horeb Rotary Club. Donations are tax deductible as allowed by law.
- The MH Rotary Foundation is administered by three members of the MH Rotary Club.

CLUB PROGRAMS FOR YOUTH:

- RYLA -Rotary Youth Leadership Awards. RYLA is a camp held each May at Camp Upham Woods near the Wisconsin Dells. The two day intensive training helps students build communication and problem solving skills, discover strategies for becoming a dynamic leader, and learn from community leaders. The program provides inspirational speakers and peer mentors. It turns motivation into action and participants form lasting friendships. The Mt. Horeb Rotary Club annually sponsors two Mt. Horeb High School sophomores to attend. Youth committee members interview all interested students to select candidates.
- The World Affairs Seminar (WAS) Is a unique interactive educational program for high school students held in June at Carroll College in Waukesha. The week-long experience brings together 300 high school students from around the world to gain a better understanding of world problems. Each year, students address a global issue (2023 will be climate change). The subject is approached academically. The students engage in critical reflection and analysis of the issue, listen to renown experts, generate action plans and engage in collaboration on global and local goals. Emphasis is on promoting better understanding of the causes of international conflict with the idea that when causes are understood, problems are more likely to have a peaceful resolution. More information is available at www.worldaffairsseminar.org. Mt. Horeb Rotary Club sends one or two Junior students annually.
- International Youth Exchange Program This program sends youth between the ages of 15 and 19 for one academic year to a host Rotary club in a different country. Applicants need to be above average students, demonstrate leadership, possess qualities of flexibility and a willingness to fully experience life in another country. The Mt. Horeb Rotary Club both sends students to other countries and hosts international students in our community. The host club provides a modest allowance for the exchange and carefully selects three or four host homes for the student during the course of the year, allowing the student to gain a greater understanding of the local culture. The exchange student becomes a family member in each host home and attends school in the host location. Opportunity is given for the exchange student to participate in Rotary activities and to absorb the culture of the host country and the host club. The exchange student need not be from a Rotary family. For the first time, in 2012/13 the Mount Horeb Rotary Club hosted an inbound student from France, and sent its first outbound student in 2014. See appendix #1 for current information.
- Interact A service club for students ages 14 to 18, is one of Rotary's fastest growing programs. The clubs are self-governing and supported. A club might be school or community based. The purpose of the club is to engage members in community and international service. The Mt. Horeb High School Interact Club was chartered in 2015.
- Short Term Exchange Program (STEP) The Rotary summer exchange program is a
 family to family exchange for students ages 15 19. Students will spend one month in
 each other's home with dates determined between the two families. A student indicates
 his/her top three country choices and a match is established. Foreign language skills
 are not necessary. All applicants must be sponsored by a Rotary Club, complete a

written application and have an in-person interview with the Youth Exchange Officer or other Rotarian. See appendix #1 for a list of Mt. Horeb student participants. For more information go to www.rotary6250.org and select Youth Programs.

- Student Rotarians Senior students at Mt. Horeb High School are invited to apply to be a student Rotarian at the beginning of the academic year. Members of the New Generations Committee select two students to attend Mt. Horeb Rotary Club meetings for each month of the academic year. The committee considers academic skills and school and community involvement in making the selections. The students are guests of the Club for each week of the month they are selected. They assist with Rotary events and learn about community service. Our Club learns about each student, their accomplishments and future plans. At the end of the year, the student Rotarians collectively present a program for our Club.
- Senior Scholarships Each year the Mt. Horeb Rotary Club establishes a dollar amount to be distributed for scholarships. Any high school senior who applies through the School Scholarship Program with a GPA of 3.0 or above is eligible. Applicants must also be involved in school activities and outside organizations, community service and demonstrate leadership in these areas. Students pursuing vocational and technical careers are encouraged to apply. The recipients are selected by a committee of Rotarians and the scholarships are announced at the Senior Awards night in May by the current Rotary Club President. Scholarships are distributed upon completion of the first semester of college or vocational school and proof of enrollment in the second semester.
- Albert Grove Memorial Scholarship This scholarship is administered through the
 Mt. Horeb Rotary Club and supported by an anonymous donor. It is currently \$3000
 and is awarded to a student pursuing a degree in math, science or engineering. The
 Rotary scholarship committee selects the recipient based on criteria established by the
 donor. The award is announced at the Senior Awards night in May.

CLUB OPERATIONS

CLUB MEETINGS

The Mount Horeb Rotary Club meets every Wednesday unless a meeting is canceled due to a holiday. Our meetings take place at Culver's Restaurant in Mount Horeb. At noon, the Rotary Bell is rung and The Four Way Test is recited to open the meeting. Our meetings follow this schedule: eating and fellowship, happy bucks, announcements, and a program. We do our best to keep the weekly meeting to one hour. Look to see who might be sitting next to you at a meeting. Be friendly and introduce yourself, you might be meeting a lifelong friend!

CLUB VOTING

The Club votes on a variety of recommendations during the course of the year. A vote is typically announced by the Club president. The voting is a combination of in person voting during a meeting, with an electronic vote available for up to 30 days after the meeting to include Club members not present at the meeting. A majority of the members establish the decision of the Club, and the results of the vote are announced. The entire club votes on filling positions of the Board and Officers, new members, the yearly budget, a change to the Club Bylaws, to discontinue a fundraiser or initiate a new fundraiser, or any item recommended by the Board for a Club vote. Day to day decisions are made by the Board or relevant Committees. All votes are final based on a simple majority of all voting members, the simple majority must be a count of at least 50% of the current club membership census plus one vote.

BOARD MEETINGS

Board meetings are held monthly on the first Tuesday of the month unless it is a holiday, in which case the meeting is held on the 2nd Tuesday. It is a breakfast meeting held at Sjölinds on Main Street in Mt. Horeb at 7:00 am. All Club members are welcome to attend the Board meetings.

COMMITTEES

Committees reflect our core values and activities. All Club members are encouraged to participate in one committee. The first activity of each committee is to prepare a request for funding for the upcoming fiscal year based on anticipated activities and to submit the request to the Board at the April Board meeting. Our Club's committees are: Community and International Grants and Service; New Generations; Social, Membership, Public Relations and Diversity; and Fundraising. Each committee has autonomy over spending its yearly allocation of funds. Club members may work with the relevant committee to request spending for a particular project or area of interest.

PROGRAMS

Programs are scheduled two times a month by the Social, Public Relations, Membership and Diversity committee. This committee works to find diverse and interesting presenters on a variety of topics. Programs may be presented by a Club member. Or a Club member may suggest a presenter to the committee. They may be Category Talks, programs of community or international interest, or pure entertainment. Category talks are opportunities to get to know our members better by having them talk about themselves and their occupation (their category).

Programs or Category Talks may not be political, unless all sides are represented. They also may not be religious nor be commercial or a solicitation of goods or services

ATTENDANCE

You are encouraged to attend as many Mount Horeb Rotary meetings as possible, but attendance is not mandatory. Your Club experience is one of fellowship and our weekly meetings are where we develop our friendships and connections. Weekly meetings are the core of your Rotary membership.

EXPECTATIONS OF MEMBERS:

- Be sure to pay your dues in a timely manner. If there is a problem, please speak with a Board member and arrangements will be made.
- Attend weekly meetings as often as you are able to.
- Wear your nametag and Rotary pin at the Wednesday meetings. (Some people put their pins on their nametag to keep them together.)
- · You should be active in one committee.
- Be outgoing and friendly; we are all friends here.
- You are also expected to participate in all three fundraisers.
- Although not required, it is generally expected that our club members contribute \$100 per member each year to the Rotary International Foundation. Please strongly consider supporting the Rotary International Foundation - EREY (Every Rotarian Every Year). 100 Percent Club member participation is necessary to qualify for District matching grants.

CLUB SCHEDULE:

- The monthly Board Meeting is held the 1st Tuesday of the Month at 7:00 am at Sjölinds Coffee Shop.
- The monthly Business Meeting is held the 1st Wednesday of the Month at the regular noon meeting. The rest of each month consists of two general programs and one session of committee meetings.
- If there is a fundraiser or social event scheduled, we usually cancel the noon meeting that week.
- Our weekly meeting schedule and scheduled speakers can be found on our website at www.mthorebrotary.com.

GUESTS

You may bring guests to weekly meetings at any time. You are responsible for providing your guest with a meal. If you are bringing a prospective member, then that person is a guest of the Club and you are not required to pay for their meal.

FUNDRAISERS: At this time, the Mount Horeb Rotary Club has three fundraisers.

• The Mount Horeb Frolic - held in early June at Grundahl Park. The club runs the Frolic Hamburger stand from Thursday evening through Sunday evening. Every member must take at least three shifts throughout the long weekend. Spouses and friends can help too. If you absolutely cannot be there, you must hire someone to take your shifts or otherwise find a replacement. Speak to the Frolic Shift manager to make arrangements. If you are on the Frolic committee, you will be responsible for the set up of the area, clean up and all other activities related to the event. This is a community service event for which the club receives about \$2000 for their efforts. These funds go into the Club Management part of the Budget. See Appendix #7 for event schedule.

- The Mount Horeb Rotary 10K Raffle is held in Mid-August at the Mount Horeb Public Safety Building. Every member is expected to participate in the event, starting by selling Raffle tickets for \$100 each. There are only 250 tickets sold and the grand prize is \$10,000. Members solicit items for a live and a silent auction. All members are expected to be present for the actual evening event, whether counting money, serving food, attending to the silent and live auctions or to one of the many other functions. It is a very fun time. This is our Club signature fundraiser and brings in much of our funding for community and international giving.
- The Super Brunch is held on SuperBowl Sunday in February at the High School. All members must be present to prepare, cook and serve the Brunch. Our menu includes pancakes, eggs, ham, sweet roll, juice milk and coffee. The Optimists Club holds a silent auction in the gym at the same time. All Club members are expected to sell ads for the Super Brunch Placemat. Most of our revenue from this event is generated by the sale of ads for the placemat.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- The board is made up of the Club President, President-elect, immediate Past President, Secretary, Treasurer, Youth Exchange Officer and three members at large including the President Elect Nominee for our club.
- Only the Board Members can vote at a Board Meeting.
- The President, President-elect and Past President hold their seats for one year.
- The Secretary, Treasurer and Youth Exchange Officer hold their seats as long as they choose to hold office. The member(s) at large hold their seats for two years.

General Club policy and management as well as the recommendation of prospective new members is handled at the Board Meeting. Board decisions are binding and shared with the Club at the monthly business meetings. The Board must have a Club vote on the yearly budget, the election of Officers and Board members, any change to the Club Bylaws, election of new Club members, changes to the fundraisers and any other matter the Board deems appropriate for a Club vote.

FEES

The cost of Active Membership is \$400 per year and dues are divided into quarterly payments, due upon receipt. All dues are payable upon receipt to the Mount Horeb Rotary Club and are to be delivered to the Treasurer in a timely fashion.

PRESIDENT ELECT TRAINING SEMINAR (PETS)

PETS is held once a year in March. The President Elect and the President Elect-Nominee attend, sponsored by the Mount Horeb Rotary Club. This is mandatory training to serve as president of the Club.

NORSK NEWS

The Mount Horeb Rotary Club has a newsletter called the Norsk News. The secretary writes up notes and announcements from each meeting and sends it to all members via email. If you are not getting the email newsletter, contact the Club Secretary.

ROTARY GEAR

The Russel-Hampton Company has a complete catalog of Rotary Items from which you can order. http://www.bestclubsupplies.com/ Our Club often has extra shirts available to purchase, check with a Board member for availability.

BUDGET

Budget planning is initiated in April with requests from each committee for funding for the next fiscal year (July 1 to June 30). The Board will schedule a budget planning meeting in April, taking into consideration the requests of the committees. All members are encouraged to attend. Income from fundraising in the current year is allocated for the upcoming year.

Fundraising income from the Super Brunch and 10K Raffle is to be divided as follows: 80% allocated for planned giving through the committees; 10% reserved for unanticipated community needs and requests; 5% allocated for unanticipated or emergency Club expenses; 5% reserved. The committee requests will determine the division of the 80% for planned giving. Funds from the Frolic go toward the Club's operating expenses. This is because Frolic income is unsolicited and we do not promise that it will be used for charitable works. Funds from the other sources are allocated for charitable giving.

The Board presents a proposed budget to the Club for approval at the May business meeting. The Club will have 30 days to review the budget and submit comments to the Board. If appropriate, a revised budget will be submitted for Club review. A Club vote on the budget will take place at the June business meeting. If the budget is not approved, the Board will review and amend the budget within 2 weeks for a vote. This process will continue until Club approval (majority vote) is obtained.

A monthly report of the Club finances will be prepared and shared with the Club at the monthly business meetings.

MEMBERSHIP

Any person, regardless of race, creed, sex, religion, ability or sexual orientation may become a member of the Mount Horeb Rotary Club. Each person in the club should be alert for potential additions to the club. When you identify a good prospect, invite that person to a meeting. If they are interested, you should offer to be their sponsor. The prospective member should fill out an application with you and attend at least three meetings to get a feel for the organization. Applications can be obtained from the Club Secretary and should be returned to the Secretary once the necessary information has been filled out. After three meetings and the receipt of the application, the Board will make a recommendation to the Club on the candidate. The Club will vote to accept or reject the candidate at the next business meeting. The applicant will not be present during the meeting in which their candidacy is voted upon.

The new member will be brought into the club by his/her sponsor at the earliest convenience, receiving the ABC's of Rotary booklet, a pin, nametag, Club Handbook, plaques and a hearty handshake.

THE ROTARIAN MAGAZINE

Rotary International publishes an official monthly magazine named The Rotarian in English (first published in 1911 as "The National Rotarian"). Your Club membership includes a subscription to The Rotarian. Other official Rotary periodicals are independently produced in more than 20 different languages and distributed in 130 countries.

SINGING

Unlike some clubs, our Club does not sing at meetings.
