Two important dates coming up for Rotary Club of Menifee

Two large Menifee city-wide events sponsored by the Rotary Club of Menifee are coming up in late September and Mid-October.

Saturday night, September 29th, the **5th Annual Mayor's Ball** is scheduled 6-10 pm at the *Marion Ashley Community Center* on Briggs Road across Highway 74 from Heritage High School. Then, two weeks later, October 13th, the annual **Menifee Motor Madness** car show will be held 9-2pm at *Mt. San Jacinto College*, off I-215 at either Scott Road or Newport Road. Both events are cosponsored by the City of Menifee.

Both are principal fund raisers for the Club, with the proceeds used for local projects such as scholarships and dictionaries for each third grade student in the area; plus contributions from the Club individually and through the Rotary Foundation for world-wide efforts to wipe out polio and ensure clean water supplies.

Rotary Club of Menifee also helps support a private orphanage in Tijuana, and members have worked handson in Central America, Africa, and India. Other signature projects of the Club include: sponsoring Interact service Clubs at Paloma Valley High School, a Rotaract Club at MSJ College, and leadership camps in the San Bernardino Mountains, as well as welcoming exchange students, and Rotarians from around the World.

While the Rotary motto is "Service Above Self," it is expected all will have a fine time at the two upcoming events. The Theme of the Mayor's Ball is "An Evening in Tokyo" in honor of the current International President of Rotary, Mr. Sajuki Tanaka. While the dress is always black-tie optional, some kimonos are expected, and there has been talk of carrying in the "Mikado," Menifee Mayor John Denver, on a sedan chair. However it is likely Rotarians John and Linda will arrive unaided. There will be a red carpet, reception desk, open bar, live music, sit-down dinner, introductions, a principal speaker, and silent auction. And, of course, plenty of dancing and socializing at

the new City's annual party for itself and its residents. Tickets for the Mayor's Ball are \$60 for singles, \$110 for couples. and \$200 for tables of four. For information and reservations, please call 672-1731.


"Menifee Motor Madness" on the MSJ campus draws dozens of rods, classics, and other motorized beauties. Their

Luncheon meetings are held at noon, Thursdays, at the *Menifee Lakes Country Club*. Rotarians are urgently needed for both of our big annual events as volunteers and as donors of trophies or auction items. Merle Dersheid

Guest Speaker

Recently a 91-year-old veteran of the U.S Merchant Marine in World War II was honored at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club of Menifee. **Merle Dersheid** of Sun City was applauded for his service to the United States and was presented with a memorial book by President **Carol "Red" Sullivan**. Merle wore his dress uniform, complete with three gold stripes on his sleeves and golden "scrambled eggs" on his visor. He attained the rank of Chief Mate, which in the Merchant Marine identified him as the second in command, after the Captain.

Merle spoke of the importance of the Merchant Marine to the United States and its allies in defeating the Axis powers. Thousands of tanks, trucks, aircraft, and countless other supplies were delivered across the Atlantic and Pacific, with serious losses suffered from attacks by enemy submarines and aircraft. The Federal Government has long ago recognized the Merchant Marine as a full and equal partner to the other branches of the military.

Merle enlisted in the peacetime Navy in 1937. His four-year enlistment expired just six weeks before Dec.7,1941. He was discharged from his billet on the battleship "California" in Hawaii. The old "battlewagon," a veteran of World War I, was badly damaged just a few weeks later and suffered many casualties in the



surprise attack by the Japanese. He meanwhile had returned home and married his sweetheart, Clova. Merle rejoined the front line action by enlisting in the Merchant Marine and, with his Navy training and natural aptitude for seamanship, he rose through the ranks to be a very young Number

2 in command of ships vital to the United States' winning the war.

Merle explained briefly to the Rotarians how the Merchant Marine got into action before the other branches because of the 1941 Lend Lease agreement between President Roosevelt, Winston Churchill, and



Joseph Stalin. As a result of that treaty, and long before we officially entered the war, our merchant mariners were sailing in harm's way through wolf packs of Nazi submarines, and with great losses because the United States hadn't yet created the protection of warships to groups of supply ships sailing together in convoys. He further mentioned our remarkable war effort in producing the first "Liberty" ships and later the larger and faster "Victory" ships. Kaiser shipyards in San Francisco and Los Angeles assembled a merchant ship from parts sent from around the Country in just four days. There are a few of the old ships left around the USA, including the "Lane Victory" in Long Beach, which is maintained and manned by volunteers and takes folks out on short cruises regularly throughout the year.

After the war Merle worked for many years as a machinist, as well as a plant supervisor. He has always stayed active with various Merchant Marine clubs in Southern California, including his present affiliation with the veterans in his retirement community. The members are planning a Veteran's Day celebration in Sun City. Rotarian and Menifee Mayor John Denver offered Merle and his shipmates whatever help the city could provide.

A group of eleven Italian Rotarians and spouses are visiting District 5330 and were hosted by the Lake Elsinore Rotary Club on August 23 at the home of **Paul & Dona Niehouse** on the shore of Lake Elsinore. The visitors were here through a Rotary Friendship Exchange program between our district and one in Italy. They have been hosted in the Temecula area and in 29 Palms. They will also be hosted in the Redlands/Riverside area and in Big Bear Lake. Previous exchanges have been with Rotary districts in Brazil and Turkey.


