#### Rotary's Four-Way Test Excerpts from "The Story Behind The Four-Way Test" by Darrell Thompson

"The Four-Way Test of the things we think, say or do....
Is it the TRUTH?
Is it FAIR to all concerned?
Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?"

So simple....the statement and the principles it embodies have helped so many find their own ethical compass. The Four-Way Test today stands as one of the organization's hallmarks.

Its creation began in the midst of the Great Depression. Herbert J. Taylor, author of the Test, was a mover, a doer, a consummate salesman and a leader of men. He was a man of action, faith and high moral principle. In 1925 Herb climbed the ladder quickly at the Jewel Tea Company and became a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago. Offered the presidency of Jewel, he chose instead to take on the challenge of helping rescue the troubled Club Aluminum Company of Chicago. This choice included a pay cut of 80% and an investment of \$6,100 of his own money to give the company some operating capital.

Looking for a way to resuscitate the company and caught in the Depression's doldrums, Herb, deeply religious, prayed for inspiration to craft a short measuring stick of ethics for the staff to use.

His initial 100 words were reduced to seven points. Still considered too long, Herb managed to streamline his principles to four searching questions that comprise the Test today. The statement was reviewed by the company's four department heads: a Roman Catholic, a Christian Scientist, an Orthodox Jew and a Presbyterian. They all agreed that the Test's principles not only coincided with their religious beliefs, but also provided an exemplary guide for personal and business life.

At Club Aluminum everything was measured against The Four-Way Test. By 1937, with strict adherence to the Test, the company's indebtedness was paid off and its net worth climbed to more that \$2 million. Thought by some to be too idealistic for the real world – The Test has survived in the arena of practical commerce.

In 1942, Richard Vernor, then an RI Director, suggested that Rotary adopt the Test. In 1943 The Four-Way Test was made a component of the Vocational Service program, although today it is considered a vital element in all four Avenues of Service.

The Test's originator, Herb Taylor, served as R.I. president in 1954-55 during the organization's golden anniversary. Copyright to The Test was transferred to Rotary International at that time.

The Four-Way Test is international, transcending national boundaries and language barriers. It knows no politics, dogma or creed. More than a code of ethics, it has all the ingredients for a successful life in every way. It can and will work in today's society. Eloquently simple, stunning in its power, undeniable,
