Past President Tracy and "Fire plug "Dick and Jerry (he was taking pictures) talked about some of their experiences at the convention and what they did with the time they had.

Tracy told us that 40,000 Rotarians descended upon Atlanta from 175 Countries all around the Globe, Tracy was one of the 1,800 volunteers that help make the Convention run smoothly. Along with the powerful speakers including the Mayor of Atlanta and the Governor of Georgia, there were Bill Gates and many other notables fro mall walks of life. The Rotary foundation received pledges for 1.2 Billion Dollars world wide for Polio.

Tracy went to one of many seminars that she attended on Human trafficking it bogles the mind that slavery is not dead but flourishing world wide even here in The United States. Did you know there are more slaves now than at any other time in history. That most of them are children. She also talked about the Actor Kushner, who has developed a web site to track people who log on to Child Pornography sites.

Tracy also talked about a new program that tries to control or at least slow down the effects of Alzheimer

She closed with telling us about the way to do a project first the funding, then the source ,then the quality and most important the follow up (what is the sense of drilling a well for water, if there is no plan for repair and upkeep was given as an example.


















The Pot Grows and the cards diminish, so if you want to miss a meeting, go ahead, that gives the rest of us a better chance to win over \$1,500

Fighting disease

Providing clean water, sanitation, and hygiene

We support local solutions to bring clean water, sanitation, and hygiene to more people every day. We don't just build wells and walk away. We share our expertise with community leaders and educators to make sure our projects succeed long-term.

Saving mothers and children

Nearly 6 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and their children can live and grow stronger.

Supporting education

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

Growing local economies

We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and create opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.
