

PROGRAM

Barbara Zach, the Executive Director of the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, got us in the musical spirit by opening the program

with a beautiful piano ballad. She claimed that she is not a performer but she certainly did wow us with her musical talent. Barbara graduated from the University o f Nebraskawith Lincoln a bachelors in both Mathematics and Music. Throughout



her college career she worked for the Department of Mathematics and Statistics as a Calculus Teaching Assistant. She joined Lincoln's Symphony Orchestra in December of 2001 and became the Executive Director in May, 2005. She is a member of Lincoln Rotary Club #14. Barb is passionate about her jobshe feels that she is truly blessed and one of very few people who really enjoy their work. During her time with us she set out to tell us 1) why she loves her work, 2) how the orchestra functions, and 3) what the musicians do between concerts. She said those are usually the topics that come up when she talks about the Orchestra.

Music is a major part of our lives. If we think about every important event there was likely music involved. As children, we learned many motor skills as we sang songs, we might remember the song that was playing when we had our first kiss. Or maybe the song that was playing when we danced with our father at our wedding. Music is also important to the development of young minds. Studies show that arts education leads to better and faster cognitive development and team work. Learning to play a musical instrument helps with physical development. And, children who study music do better in math and science.

The mission statement of the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra is: Through the performance and advancement of symphonic music, Lincoln's Symphony Orchestra will enrich, educate and entertain current and potential audiences. The Lincoln Symphony Orchestra is in its 81st year. They typically do 5 classical concerts, 2 Family events, 2 pops and one outdoor concert. There are special events at times such as the event this year with the mu-

sical group Kansas at the Pershing Auditorium. When the musicians are not performing, they are very involved in educational activities, primarily with youth. There are a

number of programs providing concert opportunities for children. Many of these are coordinated through the Lincoln Public School System. The annual Young People's Concerts are orchestra programs in which 4,000 fifth and sixth graders inside and outside Lancaster County attend a one-hour concert at the Lied Center for Performing Arts in Lincoln.

The musicians are fully professional. Over half are also teachers as the Orchestra does not provide full-time pay or benefits. There are a total of 58 contract musicians - 32 female and 26 male. Some musicians are shared with the Omaha Symphony. There are 4 full time staff members and 3 part time staff members. The Conductor of the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, Edward "Ed" Polochick, lives in Baltimore. There is not enough budget to keep him in town. He is the Artistic Director of Concert Artists of Baltimore. Barbara works with Ed to determine the programs. They look at the Orchestra members and decide who will be featured soloists. They consider guest appearances and what special focus will be for the program.

The timeline for preparing for a concert was surprising. They work for about 8 weeks. After selecting the pieces, the librarian orders the music. The music is given to the lead musicians who mark the bowings. The bowings for the strings determines the "feel" for the music - mellow or bold, slow moving or abrupt. These are returned to the librarian who writes the bowings in every musicians music copy. The music is given to the musicians about 2 weeks before the concert to begin practicing.

Barbara indicated that we are in an exciting time with the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra. We have seen a couple of years of solid financial base. This allows them to concentrate on community engagement and artistic excellence rather than the constant worry over finances.
