





### **PROGRAM**

Lloyd Castner from the Columbus Rotary spoke to the club about his father Clarence Castner who came to Nebraska on an Orphan Train in 1908. The Orphan Train

movement started in 1853 in New York City by a Congregational minister who had formed the Children's Aid Society to help needy children. It was becoming clear to the minister that the children needed help with more than just food and clothing but were in need of educational opportunities as well as



In 1854 the Society formed a plan to take orphans from New York and send them west to be placed with families. The Society decided where the trains would stop and place ads in the local papers for families to take in the children. The children were considered foster children since they were not adopted by the families. Each family however had to sign an agreement with the Society, committing to feed and clothe the child, to send them to school until they were 18 years of age, to send them to church and Sunday school and to give them a good home environment. Annually a representative from the Society would visit each family and fill out a visitation report describing the progress of the child.

Lloyd's father Clarence and his 2 brothers were placed on an orphan train in 1908 and were sent to Madison Nebraska along with 12 other children. Cla-

rence also had a sister who was placed with a family back east and did not travel on the train. The boys and girls were segregated on the train and the children slept in their seats. Each child was given a number by which they were identified for follow up visits from the Society. In Madison there were 45 applications for the 14

kids. The kids were lined up on a stage where they were picked out by the families. Two children did not get selected and were sent to Lincoln. Clarence and one brother were taken by the same family and the 3rd brother was taken by a family close by.

Clarence thrived in the new environment and went to the University of Nebraska for several years and eventually had a successful career in banking. Between the years of 1854 and 1929 over 3,000 children were placed in Nebraska by the Children's Aid Society. Many Orphan Train children went on to be very successful with 2 governors, one supreme court justice and numerous men and women serving in public life.
