PROGRAM

Roger Hoy, Professor and Director - Nebraska Tractor Test Lab

The University of Nebraska Tractor

Test Laboratory is the officially designated tractor testing station for the United States and tests tractors according to the codes of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Develo p m e n t (OECD). Twenty-



nine countries adhere to the tractor test codes (including non-OECD members: China, India, the Russian Federation and Serbia), with active tractor test stations in approximately 25 of those countries.

The cost of tractor testing and the operation of the tractor test laboratory are paid for by the tractor manufacturers and no taxpayer dollars are used to subsidize the operations of the tractor test laboratory. Since the early days, Ag Engineering students are used for much of the work.

Performance testing today consists of:

- 1) measuring the amount of power provided by the tractor's power take off (PTO). The PTO is a coupling, normally at the rear of the tractor that provides power through a rotating shaft to some agricultural implements such as rotary cutters, hay balers, grain augers, etc;
- 2) measuring the amount of tractive or pulling power a tractor can provide through the drawbar. This test is only applied to tractors of more than 100 PTO hp unless specifically requested by the manufacturer. This test measures the ability of the tractor to pull implements requiring significant tractive power such as those used for tillage;
- 3) measuring the three-point hitch lift capacity. The three point hitch provides a method to mechanically attach agricultural implements to the rear of the tractor and allows the tractors hydraulic

system to be used to raise and lower the implement;

4) measuring the remote hydraulic per-

formance. Tractors normally have one or more remote hydraulic ports that allow implements to receive hydraulic power from the tractor. This hydraulic power may be used to drive hydraulic cylinders and motors mounted on the implement. Additionally, tractors undergo a sound test that documents the sound

level at the operator ear and the sound level to which a bystander is subjected to as the tractor travels past.

Other tests are conducted for Fuel Consumption, Sound and Safety.

When testing started, it consisted only of Drawbar Power (2 above), Belt Horsepower (belts that were used to run other machinery) and Fuel Consumption.

Fuel Consumption testing early on consisted literally of weighing the fuel tank. They would weigh the fuel tank, run the tractor, and then weigh the fuel tank again to determine the amount of fuel consumed.

How did this all get started? When the tractor first came out, they said it would do the work of four horses, but how did you know? Winnipeg, Canada started having Plowing contests. They stopped during World War I. A gentleman (L.W. Chase) who was involved in those contests brought the idea back up in Fremont, Nebraska in 1917. That is when the early equipment and tests were developed.

There was bad equipment being built and marketed. There was even a company that put the name Ford on an early tractor though it was not made by the Ford Motor Company. One model was sold and never worked. People were getting fed up.

One gentleman - Wilmot F. Crozier - after trying a couple different brands

and models finally purchased a tractor that worked. So, he was convinced that they COULD work - but that companies had to be kept accountable.

Crozier got elected to the Nebraska Legislature. He teamed up with State Senator Charles Warner and they got the tractor test bill passed in 1919. Chase (who had brought testing to Fremont) provided technical assistance. The original requirements of the law were:

- 1) The Agricultural Engineering Department of UNL was responsible for testing the advertising claims
- 2) There had to be at least one parts warehouse in Nebraska
- 3) There had to be at least one repair facility in Nebraska
- 4) Sales permits would be needed (issued by Railway Commission)
- 5) A Board of Engineers was created to develop testing procedures and review test results

The test lab was set up in 1919; the original building (which is on East Campus) is now used for the Tractor Test Museum. The first model tested was the John Deere Waterloo Boy Model "N". It officially passed the tests on April 19, 1920. The smallest tractor tested had a 1 hp engine and only weighed about 400 pounds. The heaviest tractor was a Caterpillar D-9 and weighed 66,025 pounds. In 1932 they tested the first tractor using Diesel fuel. The last tractor tested using gasoline was in 1978. In 1934 the first tractor using pneumatic tires was tested. The last tractor tested with steal wheels was in 1937. The first sound test was performed in 1971. In 1920 they offered the tests for free. By 1946 they were charging \$500. Today the cost is \$11,000 to \$23,000 (depending on horse power).

The Nebraska Tractor Test Lab is the only one in the Western Hemisphere. Even though there aren't labs in other states, most states will only allow tested tractors to be sold in their state. There is some talk of taking the legislation and making it into a Federal Law.
