PROGRAM

Our Speaker was Merdan Atdayev, an exchange student at Southeast Community College from Turk-

central menistan in Asia...border countries include Afghanistan and Iraq. Merdan also was an exchange student in New York back in high school as well. The country is slightly larger than the state of California and has approximately 6 million people. The majority of the population speak Turkmen, but Russian is

also widely spoken. Turkmen, Russian, and English are all required languages in school. Turkmenistan was part of the Soviet Socialist Republic and gained it's independence in October of 1991. Their constitution was adopted in 1992. They have many holidays, but one of the most popular is Independence Day Oct. 27-28.

The children go to school from age 7 - 17. It differs from the U.S. in that they go to school on Saturdays and everyone takes the same classes in high school. They do not get to choose different courses. The children all wear uniforms and hand-made hats to school. The cuisine is similar to central Asian cuisine. Merdan's favorite food in the U.S. is pizza and wings. However, he misses the food back home. They still have many arranged marriages, but "marriages of love" are becoming more

popular. The major industry is oil. Turkmenistan is rich with oil. They are 2nd to Russian in exporting oil. They also produce a lot of coffee and are known for their beautiful Turkman carpets. They have the

> world's largest handmade carpet. These carpets are very artistic with deep rich colors.

> Merdan's plans after school are to work in an Embassy somewhere. Back home, his mom is a Physics teacher, his father is

retired from the agricultural business. He has 2 brothers (one is a Dr. and one is in the Military Academy) and 2 sisters (one is a Dr. and one is a teacher). He wishes his family could come and experience the U.S. as he has. He really enjoyed going to the big cities of New York, Boston, and Chicago.

What will he tell the people back in Turkmenistan about the U.S.: He really enjoys the friendliness of all the people here.
